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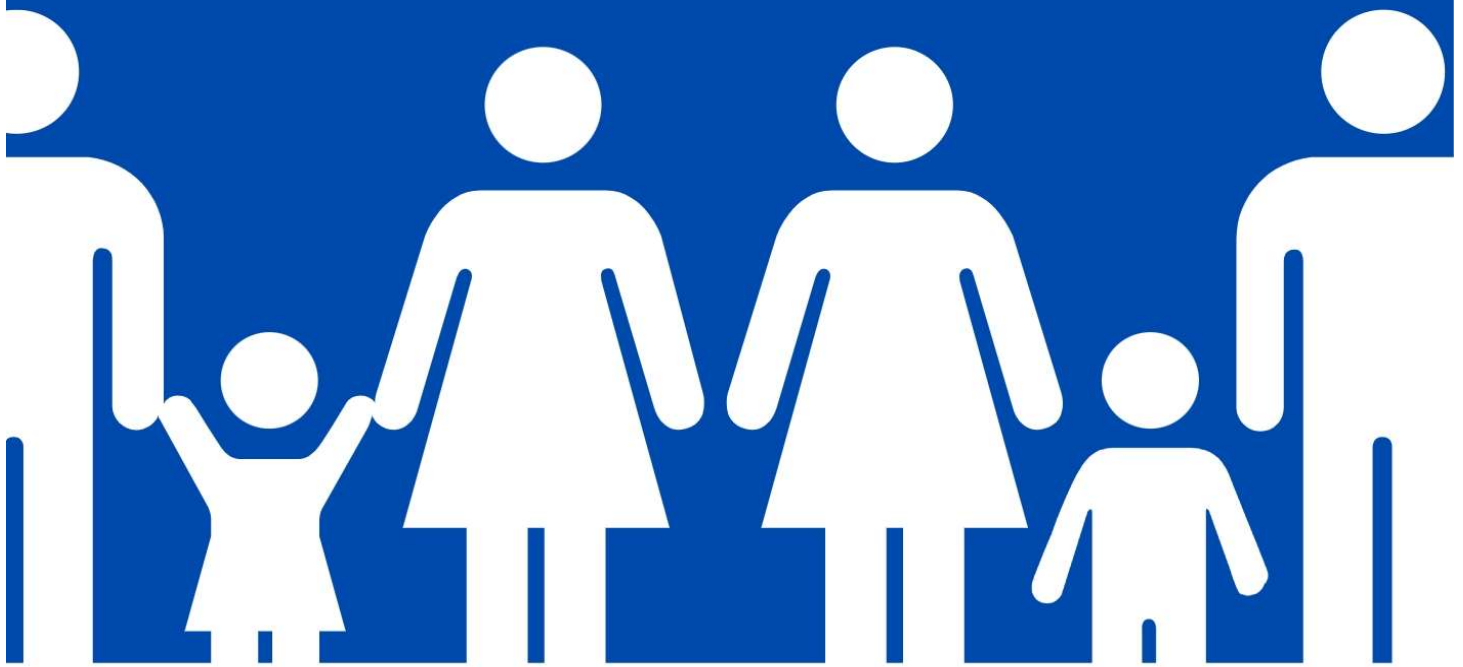

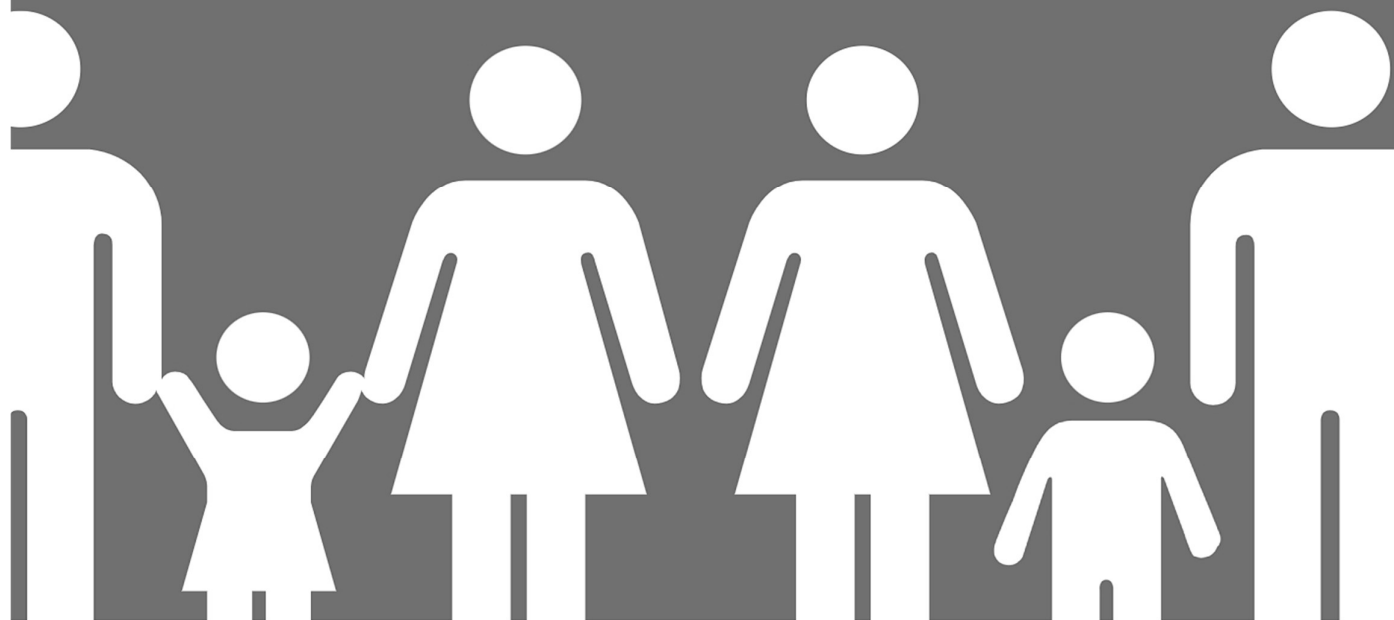

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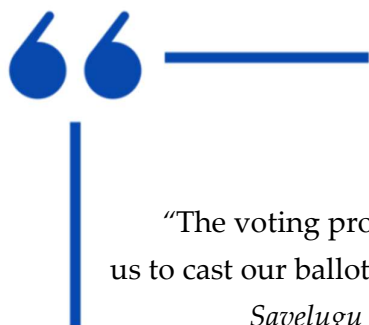

## FOREWORD

The Commission on Human Rights Administrative Justice (CHRAJ) has assessed citizen's right to vote and the general conduct of elections in years 2008, 2012 and 2016. These observation exercises together with those carried out by Civil Society Organisations (CSOs) and other state institutions have significantly contributed to the promotion of the right to vote of the citizenry.

An election is a process and not an event, as a result, CHRAJ's observation exercise covered three phases in connection with the 2020 elections namely: the pre-electoral phase, election day, and the post-electoral phase. The main objective of CHRAJ's exercise was to protect the right to vote without being corruptly influenced as well as to enhance inclusiveness in the promotion and protection of citizens' right to vote with particular focus on persons with disabilities, the elderly, pregnant and nursing women and persons with low literacy rates.

The observation activity in 2020 elections is unique by virtue of its focus on vulnerable persons. Vulnerable persons tend to face some challenges in their bid to exercise their right to vote. Some of these challenges may include difficulty in identifying polling stations, difficulty in accessing voter materials, lack of proximity to polling stations; long queues etc. Additionally, women, though entitled to equal protection by law, might be disadvantaged in situations where they are pregnant or nursing their babies.

In the past election years, CHRAJ has presented only highlights of its findings. This year, in addition to the Commissioner presenting the highlights or brief overview of the CHRAJ's findings on Thursday, 10<sup>th</sup> December 2020, the Commission has for the first time published a full report.

CHRAJ's observation exercise established that the conduct of elections was generally well organized. The report has however documented some challenges with respect to the three phases that were observed, which would require attention during subsequent election years. The Commission recommends that the EC collaborates

with relevant actors including CHRAJ, to implement recommendations in this report towards ensuring the fulfilment of the right to vote of vulnerable persons during subsequent election years.

The Commission commends the EC and its officials as well as the people of Ghana for contributing to the success of the 2020 elections.

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## 1.0 INTRODUCTION

Free and fair elections are necessary and fundamental components of sustained efforts to protect and promote human rights. The Commission on Human Rights and Administrative Justice (CHRAJ) has a critical role derived from its constitutional mandate as the National Human Rights Institution (NHRI) to maintain free and fair elections devoid of corruption and human rights violations. CHRAJ has observed the conduct of elections in 2008, 2012 and 2016, CHRAJ has sought to contribute to protecting the right to vote and the maintenance of peace and stability in the country.

All citizens have the right to participate in government and the public affairs of the country through the casting of votes or by being elected through free and fair elections<sup>1</sup>. The right to vote and to be elected is a universal and equal right of every citizen of voting age regardless of class, ethnic, racial, economic or other affiliation. This right does not merely connote the right to cast a vote, but to do so without being corruptly or improperly influenced.

Article 42 of the 1992 Constitution guarantees that every citizen of Ghana of 18 years of age or above and of sound mind has the right to vote and is entitled to be registered as a voter for the purpose of public election. Therefore, any Ghanaian of voting age who wishes to exercise his or her civil right to vote must be protected from any form of hindrance to exercise this right.

### 1.1 Background

Ghana has witnessed successful presidential and parliamentary elections since 1992 resulting in peaceful overturns of political power recorded in 2001<sup>2</sup>, 2009<sup>3</sup> and 2017<sup>4</sup>.

A major component of the elections is the observation<sup>5</sup> of the voting process. Several Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) and state institutions have observed the conduct of elections in Ghana over the years. Notable among the CSOs is the Commonwealth Observer Group which comprises eminent persons from a range of fields, including electoral commissioners, parliamentarians, legal, gender and human rights and media experts. Others include the Coalition of Domestic Election Observers (CODEO) composed of an independent and non-partisan network of civil society groups, faith-based organizations and professional bodies; and the West African Network for Peacebuilding (WANEP, Ghana).

CODEO, in the 2016 elections, involved persons with disabilities (PWDs) in the election observation programs. These observation activities for PWDs were organized and implemented in collaboration with the Ghana Federation of the Disabled (GFD), an umbrella organization of persons with disability in Ghana. The objective was to deepen the mainstreaming of PWDs in election observation in Ghana and also in governance. Although in the 2000 and 2004 elections, PWDs were involved in the activities of CODEO, their participation was restricted to tactile education and limited to election day observation. In the 2008 elections however, the objective of CODEO was broadened to create a substantial space to mainstream PWDs in observation of the election.<sup>6</sup>

CHRAJ has observed the conduct of elections held in 2008, 2012 and 2016<sup>7</sup>. These observation exercises together with those carried out by other CSOs amongst others have significantly supported efforts to promote the right to vote of the citizenry.

Whereas CSOs such as CODEO have involved persons with disabilities in the past election observation exercises, a review of the Commission's elections reports

revealed that not much consideration was given to the rights of vulnerable groups such as PWDs.

On account of the foregoing, the Commission in 2020 accorded attention to assessing the participation of vulnerable groups during the various electoral phases. These vulnerable or special groups are: persons with disabilities, the elderly, pregnant and nursing mothers as well as persons with low literacy rates, during the various electoral phases.

It is worth considering that vulnerable persons may face some challenges in their bid to exercise their right to vote. Some of these challenges may include, difficulty in identifying polling stations, difficulty in accessing voter materials, proximity to polling stations; long queues etc. Additionally, women, though entitled to equal protection by law, might be disadvantaged in situations where they are pregnant or nursing their babies.

The observation exercise therefore assessed the provision or absence of specific measures intended to guarantee the exercise of political rights by vulnerable groups that might require additional support to exercise their rights. Persons in vulnerable situations also tend to be susceptible to harm in the event of violence or unrest during the conduct of the elections and yet such persons might not be able to protect themselves or complain about such abuses.

## **1.2 Objective of the Observation Activity**

The main objective of the monitoring exercise was to enhance inclusiveness in the promotion and protection of citizens' right to vote with particular focus on persons with disabilities, the elderly, pregnant women etc., in a bid to protect the right to vote without being corruptly influenced. Specific objectives included:

- To assess the specific measures that seek to encourage and support the participation of persons with disabilities and other vulnerable groups in the electoral process<sup>8</sup>;
- Examine the extent to which the integrity of the electoral process is supported and upheld, specifically in ensuring that the electorate exercises their right to vote without being corruptly influenced.

### 1.3 Phases Observed

An election is a process and not an event, as a result, CHRAJ's observation covered three phases in connection with the 2020 elections namely: the pre-electoral phase, election day, and the post-electoral phase. News items carried by print/electronic media pertaining to the three phases also provided some assessment of the participation and patronage by the print/electronic media in the electoral process.

#### **Pre- electoral**

The pre-electoral phase encompassed voter registration, campaign activities and observation of news items by print/electronic media<sup>9</sup>. The exercise also assessed the extent to which the general environment was free from intimidation, violence and corrupt influence.

The following areas were assessed under voter registration:

1. Voter registration awareness (the process, its requirements and timelines) to citizens including vulnerable groups in particular;
2. Special measures taken where necessary to increase the participation of groups or persons in vulnerable situations (e.g. Implementation of separate queues if possible);

3. Special measures for persons with no or low literacy rates from being disenfranchised during the registration period;
4. Any other incident hindering potential voters from registering.

The following Campaign-related activities were assessed:

1. Campaign messages delivered in sign language;
2. Use of children in election during campaign;
3. Incitement to discrimination, violence or hatred in the political campaign messages of parties or candidates;
4. Activities that hindered the right of political parties, candidates and voters to freely express their opinions devoid of hate speech.

### **Election Day**

The election day is the actual day (or days) dedicated to the casting of votes by eligible voters and ends with the closure of polling stations. Areas assessed include measures adopted by the authorities to ensure that the electorate particularly vulnerable groups such as persons with disabilities were able to vote devoid of violence, disturbances, or acts of intimidation.

### **Post-Electoral**

The post-electoral phase spans the period from the closure of polling stations to the announcement of the final results and to two months following the declaration of results<sup>10</sup>.

## **1.4 Methods and Scope**

### **Voter Registration Observation**

As part of the right to vote observation exercise, CHRAJ deployed 250 officers nationwide to observe the voter registration exercise at various centres from July 15

to the end of the exercise on August 6, 2020. Observers were provided checklists as the main data collection tool. Each observer was tasked to observe 10 centres in proximity to their place of residence. Each centre visited was observed for a period, not less than three (3) hours in any given day. Responses concerning the checklist were submitted to a collation team via google form.

### **Campaign Observation**

CHRAJ also tasked its regional and district officers nationwide to observe campaign activities of all political parties within their jurisdictions between 10th November and 4th December, 2020. Observers were equipped with checklists developed by the Commission specifically for the exercise. Observers were tasked to observe as many campaign activities as possible over the slated period.

### **Newspaper Review**

Newspapers available to the Research Department of the Commission, namely the Daily Graphic, Ghanaian Times, Mirror and Spectator were also reviewed. The focus of the review was on voter education, voter registration exercise conducted, EC activities, election campaigns and post-election issues, among others, over the period of September 2020 to January 2021. In total, 202 news items on the general elections were extracted, with Daily Graphic covering 109 news items, the Ghanaian Times 92, the Mirror 1(one) and the Spectator none. However, the total news items of interest to CHRAJ's observation of the 2020 presidential and parliamentary elections were 126 (Daily Graphic 73, Ghanaian times 52, the Mirror 1 while the Spectator had none).

### **Training towards Election Day Observation**

CHRAJ in collaboration with the EC organized a virtual training for all CHRAJ observers in November, 2020<sup>11</sup>. The training was to provide observers with an understanding of the electoral processes, the role of observers as well as the tools for

the observation. The training was undertaken in two parts. The first part was facilitated by the EC and the second by CHRAJ.

A second virtual simulation training was organized, also in November<sup>12</sup> on how to access and use the online questionnaire and report through same. Following the training sessions, observers did trial submissions of responses in November so as to afford all observers the ability to correctly use the online questionnaires on election day.

### **Deployment of Observers on Election Day<sup>13</sup>**

The Commission deployed 279 observers on December 7, 2020, made up of 41 Roaming and 238 Non-Roaming Observers.

#### ***Roaming Observers***

- Roaming Observers comprised Commission Members, Departmental, Regional and District Directors who had been assigned official vehicles;
- Commissioners oversaw the entire exercise and responded to incidents nationwide;
- Departmental directors oversaw the exercise within selected regions and observed selected hotspots;
- Regional directors oversaw the exercise within regions and observed selected hotspots;
- District directors with official vehicles oversaw the exercise within their districts and observed selected hotspots.

### *Non-Roaming Observers*

- This category of observers was stationed at one polling station where they cast their votes and observed proceedings from the beginning at 7:00 am to the end of polls.
- Not more than one observer observed at one polling station. Where two observers met at one polling station, one relocated to another after casting his/her vote.

### **Arrangements for Election Day**

On election day, the following arrangements were made for the observation exercise:

- A Coordinating Centre was set up with three working groups namely the Data Gathering, Analysis and Decision-Making. The Data Gathering workgroup received correspondence and addressed issues from observers on the field. The Analysis group analysed reports that came from the field via the online setup while the Decision -Making group made decisions intermittently based on reports from the Analysis workgroup.
- Observers used the online link to submit their checklists to the Coordinating Centre in the following manner:
  - **Pre-polls checklist:** Submitted by non-roaming observers between 7 and 8 am.
  - **Incidents checklist:** Submitted by both roaming and non-roaming observers immediately an incident occurs.
  - **During and after Polling Checklist:** Submitted by non-roaming observers immediately after the ballots were counted at a polling centre.

### **Interim report**

An interim report (see appendix 8) was compiled and presented by the Commissioner on the 11<sup>th</sup> December 2020, four days after the general elections.



## 1.5 Summary of Results

The observation exercise covered three phases in connection with the 2020 elections namely: the pre-electoral phase, Election Day, and the post- electoral phase.

### **Pre-Electoral Phase**

This phase comprised voter registration and campaign observation.

### **Voter Registration Observation**

The voter registration observation exercise covered 16 regions, 189 constituencies and 1,842 registration centres. In addition, daily newspapers available<sup>14</sup> to CHRAJ were reviewed.

### **Voter Registration Awareness**

The EC in creating voter awareness trained the visually impaired on how to use the tactile ballot jacket ahead of December 7 to encourage them to take part in the election<sup>15</sup>. According to the Ashanti Regional Gender, Youth and Disability Desk Officer, Mrs. Henrietta Chempe Sarpong, about 4000 visually impaired had been trained on the use of the tactile ballot jacket<sup>16</sup>.

### **Special Measures Taken to Increase the Participation of Groups or Persons in Vulnerable Situations**

Most of the centres visited (96.3%) were easily accessible and user friendly to the special groups of persons especially PWDs. For centres that were deemed inaccessible, PWDs had to use staircases aided by the EC officials and other prospective applicants to go through the registration process. In other cases, PWDs were either redirected to much more disability friendly registration centres nearby or directed to go to the EC's District offices nearby to register.

With regards to preferential treatment for vulnerable or special groups (i.e. PWDs, elderly, pregnant women, and nursing mothers), most centres (87.5%) made them join

separate queues, provided separate seats that gave priority to them or assisted them to register upon arrival.

Concerning applicants with low literacy, some (from 270 registration centres) were unable to provide key information for their registration. Challenges faced by such applicants included the inability to; spell their names, provide date of birth, parents' full names, house address, name of hometown or district they hail from. In such instances, relations or neighbours were allowed to help provide relevant details or guarantee where necessary.

### **Campaigns Observation**

From the report from the Commission's 122 observation officers covering 546 campaign activities across 15 regions, 115 constituencies and 384 towns and communities, the various campaign activities were generally peaceful devoid of intimidation, violence, and insulting or abusive language.

However, newspaper reviews over the campaign period recorded one case of an act of violence during the campaign period between supporters of the NPP and NDC<sup>17</sup>.

### **Election Day**

A total of 298 polling centres<sup>18</sup> were observed in all 16 regions, namely Greater Accra, Eastern, Western, Western North, Ashanti, Volta, Oti, Ashanti, Bono East, Bono, Savannah, Northern, Upper East, Upper West and North East.

Also, a total of 181 vulnerable persons consisting of the aged, visually impaired persons, hearing impaired, persons with physical disabilities, pregnant and nursing women were interviewed at 103<sup>19</sup> polling stations across the 16 regions.

This election day observation exercise included among others, finding out arrangements made for persons in vulnerable situations.

## **Persons in Vulnerable Situations**

In the majority of the polling stations observed, separate arrangements were made for the arm or leg impaired (76.2%), visually impaired (82.6%), hearing impaired (69.5%), elderly (75 years and above) (86.2%) and pregnant women (83.6%).

The following were some of the common arrangements made for persons in a vulnerable situation:

- Chairs were provided and they were attended to promptly;
- They were allowed to vote as soon as they arrived at the polling station;
- A separate queue was formed and they were attended to before other voters;
- There was a large display of ballot paper for the visually impaired.

## **Challenges Faced by Persons with Disability, Elderly (75 Years and Above) and Pregnant Women during the Voting Process**

Eight (4.4%) of the vulnerable interacted<sup>20</sup> with stated that they experienced some challenges. Four, visually impaired could not vote with the tactile braille, whereas the other four indicated they were not given preferential treatment.

## **Challenges Faced by Persons with Low Literacy during the Voting Process**

Sixty 60 (20.1%) persons with low literacy had challenges during the voting process.

Some of the common challenges encountered by these persons include the following:

- Inability to distinguish between the presidential and parliamentary ballot boxes;
- Difficulty in identifying preferred candidates on the ballot paper;
- Not knowing how to fold back the ballot sheet into the ballot box after the thumb- print;
- Not knowing where to cast vote after collecting ballot paper was issued to them;
- Not knowing how to thumb print on the ballot paper.

## **Post-Electoral Phase**

The post-electoral phase spanned the closure of polling stations to the announcement of the final results and to two months following the declaration of results.

## **Peaceful, Free and Fair Elections**

CHRAJ described the December 7, 2020, general election as free, fair and transparent<sup>21</sup>. Besides, the National Commission for Civic Education (NCCE) and CODEO generally expressed their satisfaction with the conduct and management of the presidential and parliamentary elections<sup>22</sup>.

## **Reported Post-Electoral Violence**

Newspaper reports indicated some cases of post-electoral violence, which reportedly were being investigated<sup>23</sup>

## **Declaration of Election Results by the EC**

The EC chairperson declared President Nana Akufo-Addo the winner of the 2020 presidential elections with 6,730,413 representing 51.595% of the total valid votes cast.<sup>24</sup>

## **Election Petition**

The declaration received a rejection by the major opposition party, the NDC<sup>25</sup> and a petition was filed at the Supreme Court on the 30<sup>th</sup> December 2020. The Justices of the Supreme Court stated in a ruling<sup>26</sup> that the validity of the declaration by the Electoral Commission on 9<sup>th</sup> December 2020 could not be discounted as the petitioner's allegations were not backed with enough tangible evidence.

## **Inauguration and swearing-in of President**

The seventh parliament was dissolved at midnight of January 6, 2021, and President Nana Akufo-Addo sworn into office on January 7, 2021<sup>27</sup>.

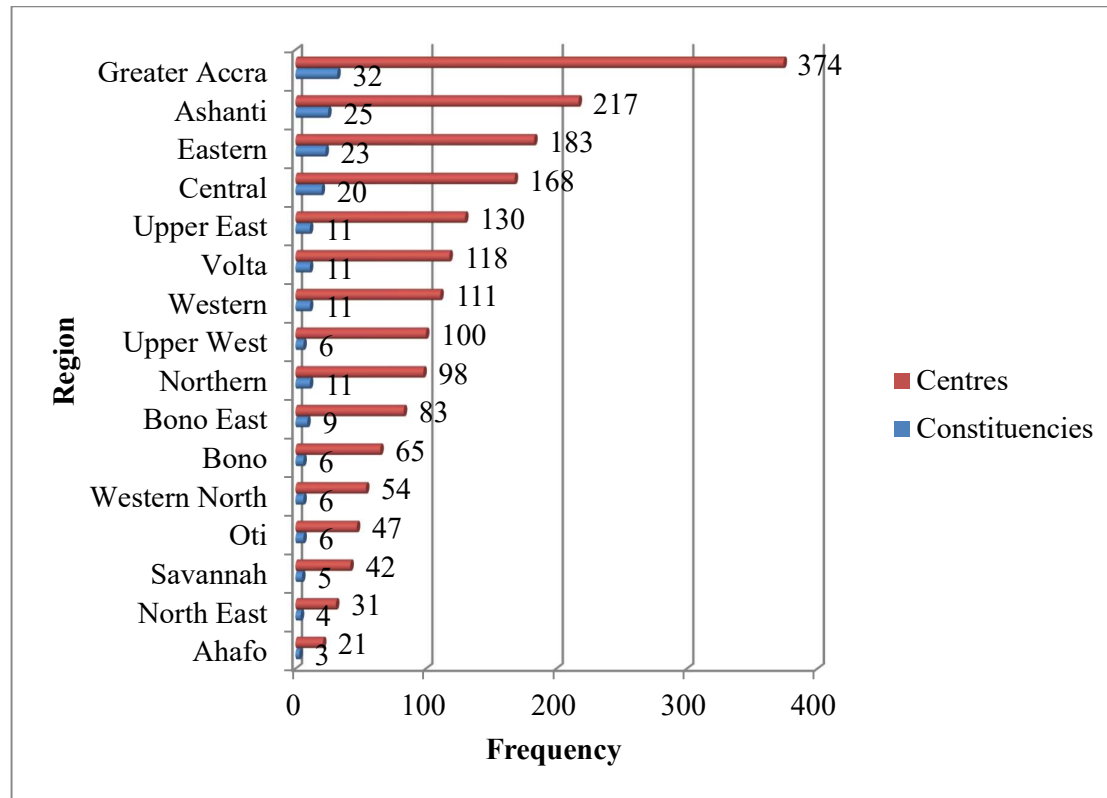
## **PRE-ELECTORAL PHASE**



## 2.1 Voter's Registration Exercise

### 2.1.1 Registration Centres

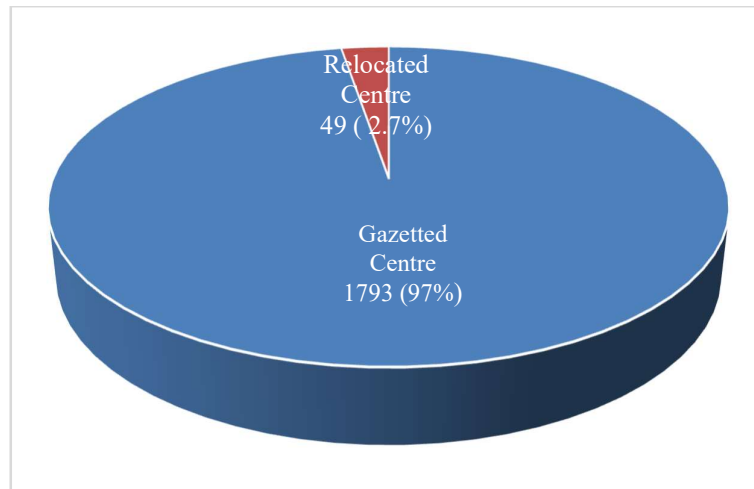
The exercise covered 16 regions, 189 constituencies and 1,842 registration centres. The breakdown is presented in Figure 1 (see Appendix 1 for details of centres: Tables 1-16).



**Figure 1: Region and Centre observed**

The exercise covered 32 out of 36 constituencies in Greater Accra with 374 registration centres observed. This was closely followed by the Ashanti region with 25 out of 51 constituencies and 217 registration centres observed. The observation exercise also covered 183 registration centres across 23 out of 35 constituencies in the Eastern region of Ghana. In addition, 21 registration centres from three constituencies in the Ahafo region, and 31 registration centres from four constituencies in the North East regions were observed. (See Figure 1).

One thousand, seven hundred and ninety- three (1,793), constituting 97.3% of the registration centres visited were exactly as gazetted<sup>28</sup> by the EC of Ghana, however, forty- nine (49) had been relocated. The change in the location however did not result in any challenge. (See Figure 2).



**Figure 2: Status of Registration Centre**

In all cases, the new centre chosen was not far from the gazetted centre. The reasons for the change in location included making the centre more accessible, safe and user friendly as well as ensuring that the COVID-19 protocol requirements could be effected.

“The original place which was gazetted by the EC is being used by the JHS students for their final year exams. Therefore, a new venue was chosen close to the gazetted centre. However, when it rains, it affects the registration exercise. Hence the need to relocate.” *Registration official, Compound 1 Nsuta 1, (A122701), Tarkwa Nsuaem Municipal, Western region*

“The centre was previously at the school's assembly hall but because of COVID-19 protocols it was moved to the administration block to prevent

applicants coming into contact with students”. *Registration official, Damongo S H S (N030202), West Gonja, Savannah region*

“Due to the dilapidated state of the roofing of SCMB SHED, parties agreed that the centre should be moved to the D/C PRIM SCH which is exactly behind the gazetted place”. *Registration official, D/C PRIM SCH OCHISOA (B153204), Asikuma Odoben Brakwa, Central region*

“The new centre was within the main community which was easily accessible by members of the community than the gazetted centre which was at the outskirt and about 800meters from the community”. *Registration official, DA Primary School, Abotsia (B071606), Gomoa West, Central region*

“It did not affect prospective applicants because the original centre which was their old primary school building had collapsed and a new one built at the outskirt of the village. The community, therefore, decided to use their durbar grounds which was located in the middle of the community to make it more accessible to applicants. An announcement was consequently made to that effect at the Community's Information Centre”. *Registration official, D/A Primary School 2, Anhwiesu (B171202), Assin North, Central region*

### **2.1.2 Registration Officers and Materials**

#### ***Officers***

All the registration centres observed had a registration officer and an assistant, data entry clerk (mostly 2 persons), laminator, registration officer on special duties, representatives of some political parties and a nurse (in most cases).



At the time of visit, 1,790 (97.2%) of the centres had their registration officer present. In his/her absence, the centre was manned by the assistant. Also, 1,788 (97.1%) of the centres had their assistant registration officer present. The registration officer for special duties sometimes assisted the registration officer.

### ***Materials***

Each centre had the following materials in place;

- Registration forms
- Voter registration identification guarantee form
- Biometric voter registration machine
- Cameras and accessories
- Printers and accessories
- Indelible ink

At the time of visit, almost all the centres (99.9%) had enough of these materials. The only two centres that had a shortage of some materials were:

- Brilliant Stars Academy, Walewale in the North East region had a shortage of indelible ink.
- Presby Church, Afutukope (Afienya) at Ningo Prampram constituency had a shortage of cartridges. The shortage stalled the process until the special duty officer secured one from the district office of the EC the next day.

The biometric machines were functional in most of the centres observed (99.3%), however, few (12) of the machines could not adequately capture the thumb-prints of the applicants. In such cases, applicants were made to wash their hands over again (sometimes five times) until the thumb-print was captured. For instance, at the Pentecost Church Skiayinor Baatsona of Krowor constituency in the Greater Accra region, an applicant had to spend two days in efforts to get his thumb-print captured.

When the issue of *facial only*<sup>29</sup> was suggested by applicants present at the time, the EC officials indicated they had been instructed not to register anyone by *facial only* but directed the applicant to visit the district office<sup>30</sup>.

### *Security*

Of the 1,842 centres observed, a majority of 1,366 (74.2%) had public security personnel present to maintain peace and order. The security personnel in most of the centres were at most two. However, 59 (3.2%) centres had more than two police officers present<sup>31</sup>. Seventy-Seven<sup>32</sup> (5.6%) registration centres had armed security personnel.

Centres, where the presence of more security personnel was recorded was due to the following reasons:

- Centre being the registration centre of the President of the country;
- Dignitaries like a Member of Parliament (MP) visiting the registration centre;
- Maintain order especially where some applicants do not want to join the queue and sometimes create chaos; and
- Patrol purposes.

Applicants seemed unconcerned by the presence of security personnel in instances where they numbered more than two.

### **2.1.3 Incidence of Violence, Chaos and Intimidation**

A total of 99 centres witnessed some kinds of disruptions that had the potential of preventing prospective applicants from registering. These included; misunderstanding between political party agents; applicants who lived far away from

the registration centre being prevented from registering at the centre; prospective applicant intimidated and other disorderly behaviour.

For instance, at the Shipmu London Bridge (B021604), Cape Coast south constituency in the Central region, there was some misunderstanding between agents of the political parties present which necessitated the intervention of military officers.

As part of efforts to address some of such incidences, the following measures were employed:

- Security personnel were called upon to remove/sack anyone creating disorder at the centre;
- Arrest was made by the security personnel and culprits sent to the police station;
- Registration officers educated registrants.

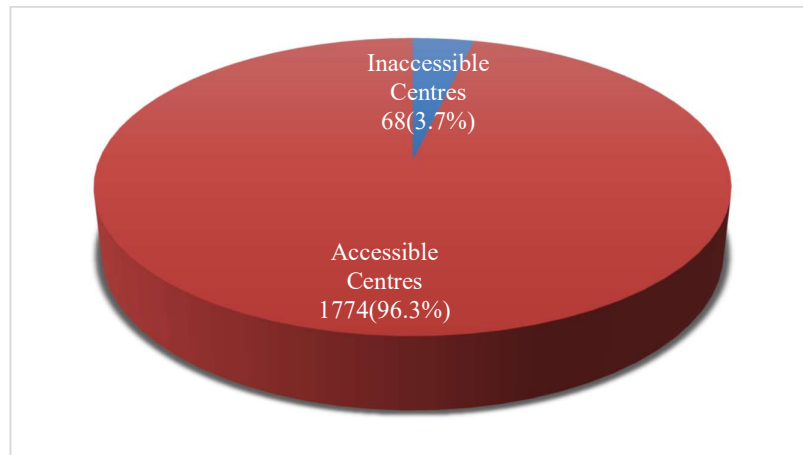
#### **2.1.4 Fulfilling The Right to Vote**

There was no report of military, police or party officials preventing citizens from accessing the centre to register in order to participate freely and fairly in the general electoral processes in Ghana.

#### **2.1.5 Special Group of Persons**

The voter registration observation exercise also focused on PWDs, the elderly, pregnant women, nursing mothers, and persons with low literacy in the area of accessibility and preferential treatment. A directive was given by the EC to offer preferential treatment to these applicants at the various registration centres. These applicants also had the option of registering at the EC's district offices.

Most (96.3%) of the centres visited were easily accessible and user friendly to the special groups of persons especially, PWDs. For centres that were deemed inaccessible, PWDs had to use a staircase aided by the EC officials and other prospective applicants to go through the registration process. (*See Figure 3*)



***Figure 3: Accessibility of Centre to PWDs***

In some cases, PWDs were redirected to much more disability friendly registration centres nearby. Others were also directed to go to the EC's District offices nearby to register.

With regard to preferential treatment for special groups (i.e. PWDs, elderly, pregnant women, and nursing mothers etc.), most centres (87.5%) made them join separate queues, provided separate desks that gave priority to them or assisted them to register upon arrival.

Concerning applicants with low literacy, some (from 270 registration centres) were unable to provide key information for their registration. Challenges faced by such applicants included the inability to spell their names, provide date of birth, parents' full names, house address, name of hometown or district they hail from. In such instances, relations or neighbours were allowed to help provide relevant details or guarantee the validity of relevant information where necessary.

#### **2.1.6 COVID-19 Risk Mitigating Strategies**

Almost all the centres visited observed COVID-19 risk mitigating strategies including: social/physical distancing, wearing of face masks, regular use of hand sanitisers, provision of soap and running water for washing of hands before registration, use of temperature guns before applicants entered the registration centre, and use of alcohol wipes on the biometric machine before capturing fingerprints. The EC officials also

used tape to cordon the registration area where they had their setup. The prospective applicants formed a queue beyond this area and were called to enter the cordoned registration area to take part in the registration process.

### ***Social/Physical Distancing***

The majority (94.8%) of the centres visited had EC officials who duly followed social/physical distancing among themselves. Where social/physical distancing was not duly observed, it often occurred in the data entry section. Again, 86.20% of the centres observed ensured the observation of social/physical distancing protocols of an arm's-length among prospective applicants.

### ***Wearing of Face Masks and Use of Hand Sanitisers***

During the time of visit, all officers were in face masks and hand sanitisers were made available for use. The EC officials strictly ensured no applicant without a face mask was allowed to register, however, a number of applicants at the registration premises were not on a face mask.

### ***Hand Washing***

The majority (98.6%) of centres visited had soap and running water for washing of hands for use. The officials ensured that all applicants washed their hands before going through the registration exercise. The rest of the centres (1.4%) could not observe the washing of hands either because the veronica buckets had run out of water, or the bucket had gotten damaged, or the centre did not have one at all.

### ***Use of Temperature Guns***

With regard to temperature guns, the majority (88.5%) of the centres had a functional temperature gun for use whereas the remaining 11.5% either had a malfunctioning temperature gun or provision was not made at all.

“The temperature gun became faulty three days ago and it has since not been replaced” *Registration Official, Malik Park (C211015), Ledzokuku, Greater Accra.*

### ***Disinfecting Biometric Machines***

Again, most (87.9%) of the centres visited observed the wiping of the biometric machine before capturing the fingerprints of the applicants. Officers who could not strictly follow this explained that the device encountered difficulty in picking the thumb-print of applicants after wiping the surface with the alcohol wipe. In view of this, the officials had to sanitize the applicant’s hand either before or after the thumb-print was captured.

## **2.2 Voter Education**

According to newspaper reports, CODEO observed that voter education was generally low in the country and urged the NCCE and the EC not to limit their voter education to the traditional media<sup>33</sup>. The Institute for Democratic Governance (IDEG), also called on political actors to advocate intensive voter education<sup>34</sup> as well as a general call on citizens to go out and cast their votes on December 7, 2020<sup>35</sup>.

## **2.3 Training of Visually Impaired on Tactile Braille**

The EC in creating voter awareness trained the visually impaired on how to use the tactile ballot jacket ahead of December 7 to encourage them to take part in the election<sup>36</sup>. According to the Ashanti Regional Gender, Youth and Disability Desk Officer, about 4000 visually impaired had been trained on the tactile ballot jacket<sup>37</sup>.

## 2.4 Electoral Commission Activities

### **Voter Exhibition**

Voter exhibition was organised for citizens to verify their voter details, make claims for omitted data, amend incorrect details, know voters polling stations and object to the inclusion of names of unqualified persons<sup>38</sup>. Verification was made easier through the short code, 1422 at a cost of 0.30p<sup>39</sup>.

### **Addressing Voter Anomalies**

There were anomalies during the voter exhibition such as missing names. The EC gave opportunity for these to be corrected. Persons who flouted electoral laws were disqualified<sup>40</sup>.

### **Re-Opening of Voter Register and Vote Transfer**

The voters' register was re-opened in the various district offices across the country for various categories of persons, namely citizens who had just attained the age of 18, persons who for one reason or the other who were not able to register, persons who were issued voter ID cards but could not find their names during the exhibition exercise, and those who were under the 14 days mandatory quarantine to register. Students and members of the security agencies were also allowed to transfer their votes<sup>41</sup>.

### **Securing Voter Transparency**

Deputy Electoral Commissioner mentioned that representatives from the various political parties were to be involved in the printing of ballot papers to ensure greater transparency for the elections<sup>42</sup>.

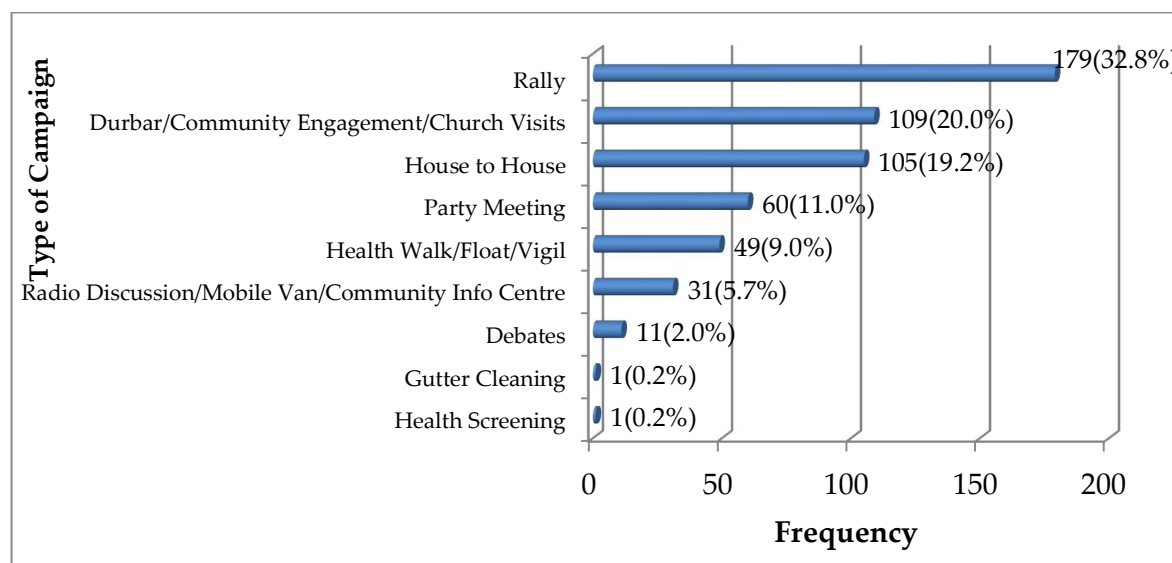

## 2.5 Campaigns Observation

The campaign activities of both the presidential and parliamentary candidates of five political parties were observed. They were the Ghana Union Movement (GUM), New Patriotic Party (NPP), National Democratic Congress (NDC), Convention People's Party (CPP) and Liberty Party of Ghana (LPG). The findings are discussed under the following subsections.

### 2.5.1 Location and Type of Campaign Observed

CHRAJ observed 546 various types of political campaigns activities across 15 regions (with the exception of the Bono Region), 115 constituencies and 384 towns and communities. The activities included Rallies, Durbars, House to House, Health walk, among others (*see Figure 4 for the breakdown*).



**Figure 4: Type of Campaign Activities Observed**

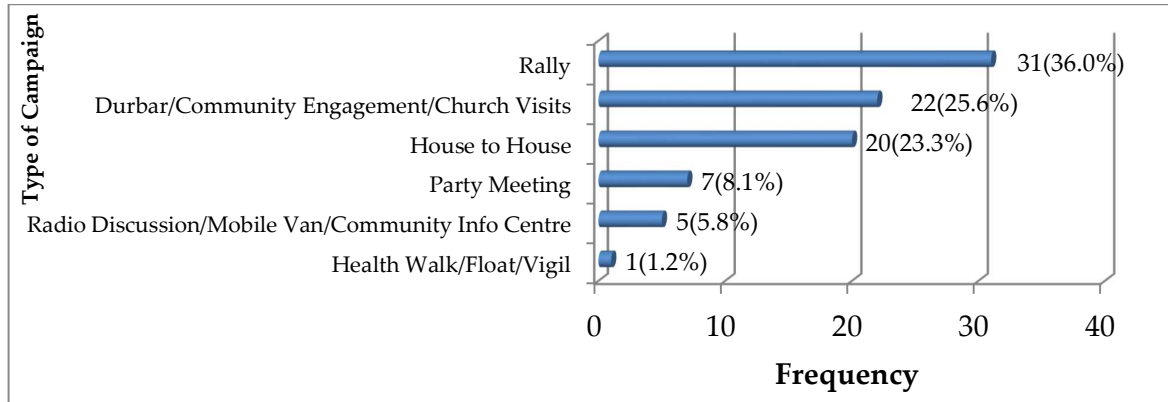

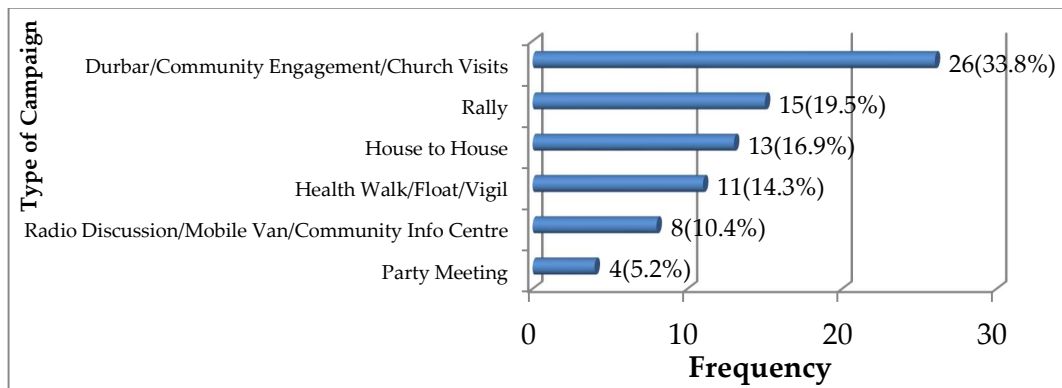


**Figure 4a: Type of Campaign Activities Observed in the Ashanti Region**

Rallies (32.8%), Durbars/Community Engagement/Church Visits (20.0%), House to House visits (19.2%) were the major campaign activities of all the political parties (*See Figure 4*).

The subsequent sub-sections provide the breakdown of the type of campaign activities observed by region, constituencies, as well as towns and communities visited.



### *Ashanti Region*

In this region, 86 various types of campaign activities were observed across 22 constituencies and 60 towns/communities. The breakdown of campaign activities is provided in Figure 4a.

The main campaign activities were in the areas of Rally (36.0%), Durbar/Community Engagement/Church Visits (25.6%) and House to House visits (23.3%).

### *Central Region*

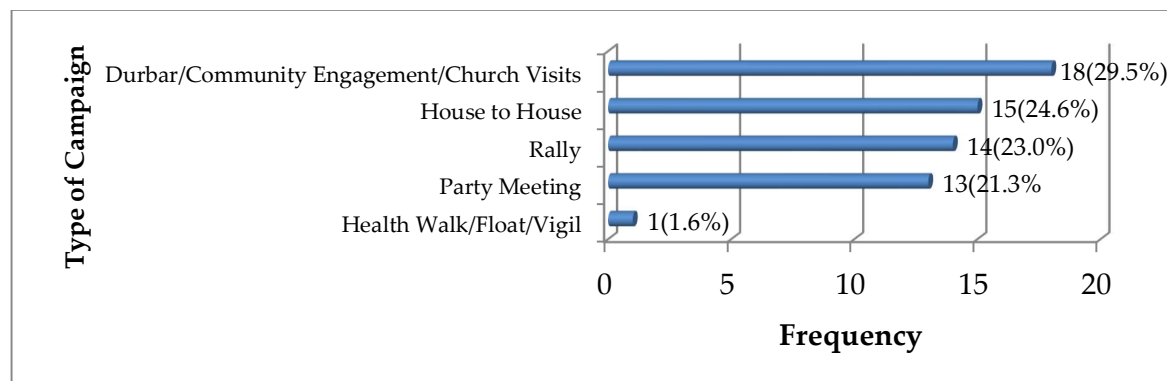


**Figure 4b: Type of Campaign Activities Observed in the Central Region**

In all, 77 campaign activities were observed across 15 constituencies and 54 towns/communities in this region. The breakdown of the type of campaigns is presented in Figure 4b.

The main campaign activities were in the areas of Durbar/Community Engagement/Church Visits (33.8%), Rally (19.5%), House to House visits (23.3%), and Health Walk/Float/Vigil (14.3%).

### ***Savannah Region***

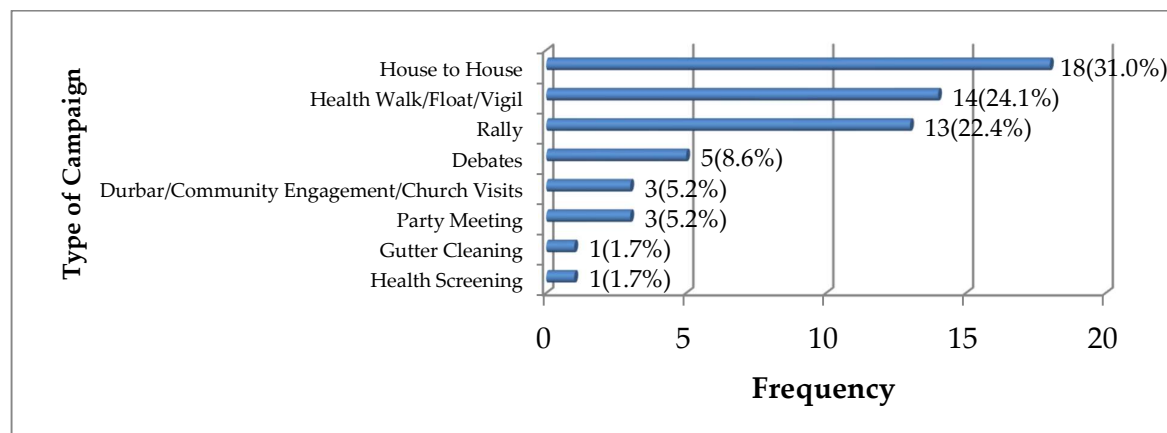


***Figure 4c: Type of Campaign Activities Observed in the Savannah Region***

A total of 61 election campaign activities were observed in this region across 4 constituencies and 42 towns/communities. See Figure 4c for the breakdown.

The main campaign activities were in the areas of Durbar/Community Engagement/Church Visits (29.5%), House to House visits (24.6%), Rally (23.0%), and Party Meetings (21.3%).

### ***Greater Accra Region***

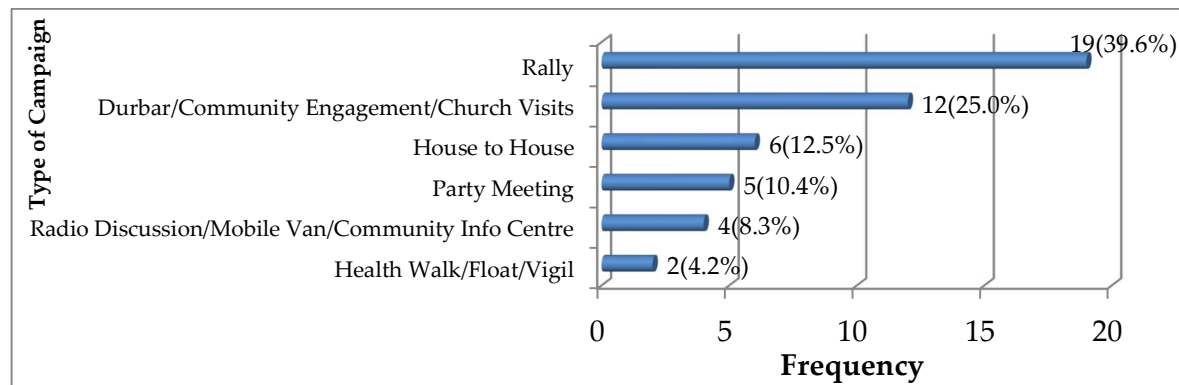


***Figure 4d: Type of Campaign Activities Observed in the Greater Accra***

A total of 58 election campaign activities were observed in this region across 14 constituencies and 36 towns/communities (see Figure 4d for breakdown).

The main campaign activities were in the areas of House to House visits (31.0%), Health Walk/Float/Vigil (24.1%), and Rally (22.4%).

### ***Volta Region***

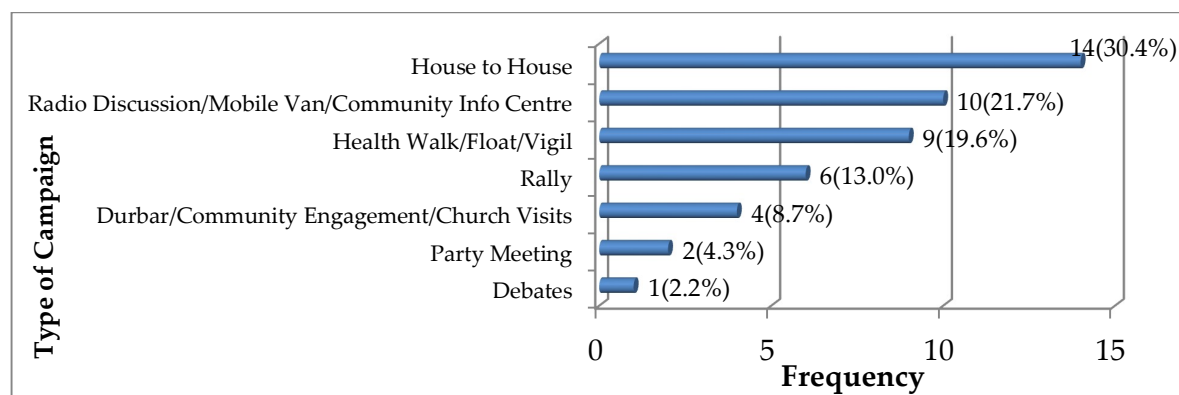


***Figure 4e: Type of Campaign Activities Observed in the Volta Region***

In all, 48 campaign activities were observed across 10 constituencies and 41 towns/communities in this region. The breakdown of the type of campaigns is presented in Figure 4e.

The main campaign activities were in the areas of Rally (39.6%), Durbar/Community Engagement/Church Visits (25.0%), House to House visits (12.5%), and Party Meetings (10.4%).

### ***Western Region***

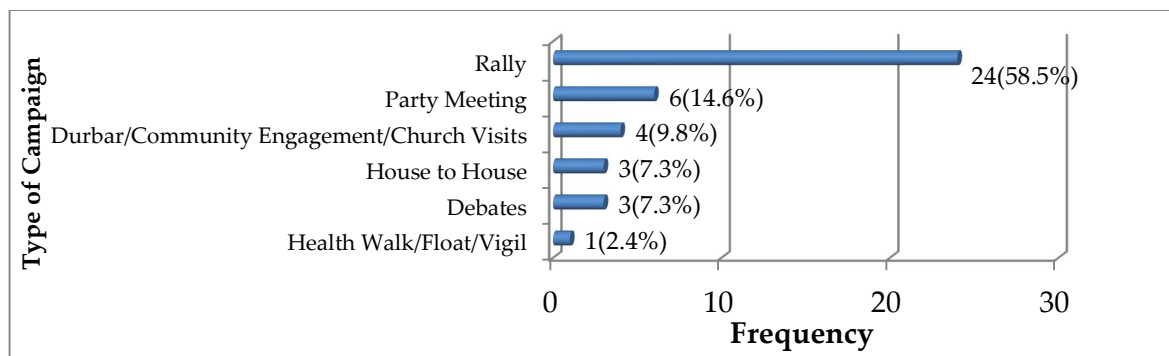


***Figure 4f: Type of Campaign Activities Observed in the Western Region***

In this region, 46 various types of campaign activities were observed across 10 constituencies and 31 towns/communities. The breakdown of campaign activities is provided in Figure 4f.

The main campaign activities were in the areas of House to House visits (30.4%), Radio Discussions/Mobile Van/Community Information Centre (21.7%), Health Walk/Float/Vigil (19.6%), and Rally (13.0%).

### *Northern Region*

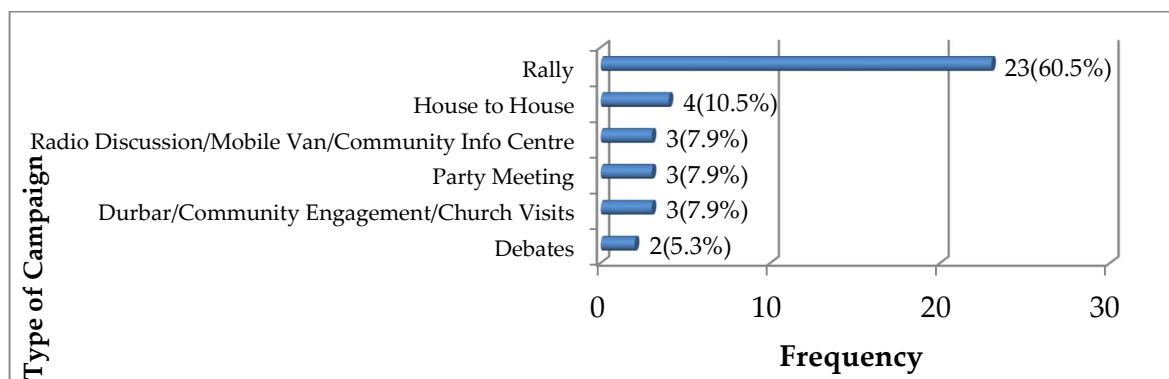


**Figure 4g: Type of Campaign Activities Observed in the Northern Region**

In this region, 41 various types of campaign activities were observed across 8 constituencies and 31 towns/communities. The breakdown of campaign activities is provided in Figure 4g.

The main campaign activities were in the areas of Rally (58.5%) and Party Meetings (14.6%).

### *Upper West Region*

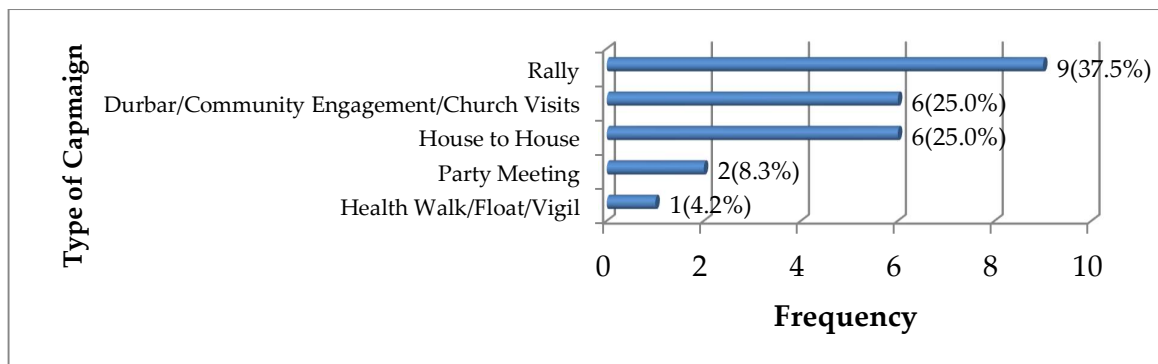


**Figure 4h: Type of Campaign Activities Observed in the Upper West Region**

In all, 38 campaign activities were observed across 6 constituencies and 30 towns/communities in this region. The breakdown of the type of campaigns is presented in Figure 4h.

The main campaign activities were in the areas of Rally (60.5%) and House to House (10.5%).

### *Eastern Region*

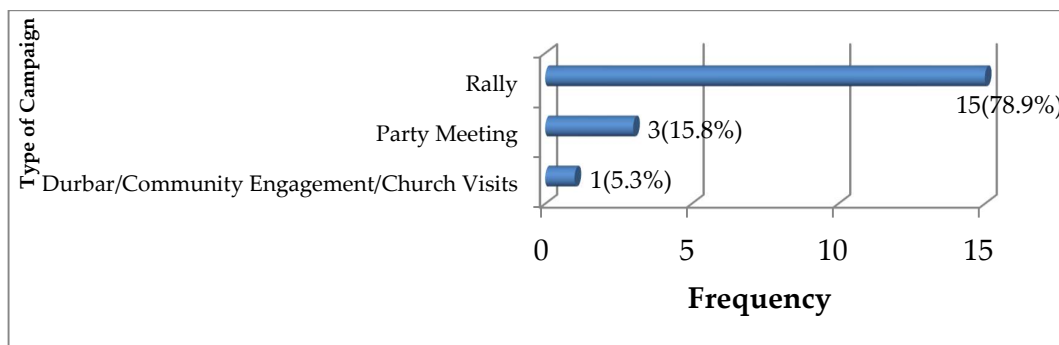


**Figure 4i: Type of Campaign Activities Observed in the Eastern Region**

A total of 24 various types of campaign activities were observed across 8 constituencies and 18 towns/communities in this region. The breakdown of campaign activities is provided in Figure 4i.

The main campaign activities were in the areas of Rally (37.5%), Durbar/Community Engagement/Church Visit (25.0%) and House to House visits (25.0%).

### *North -East Region*

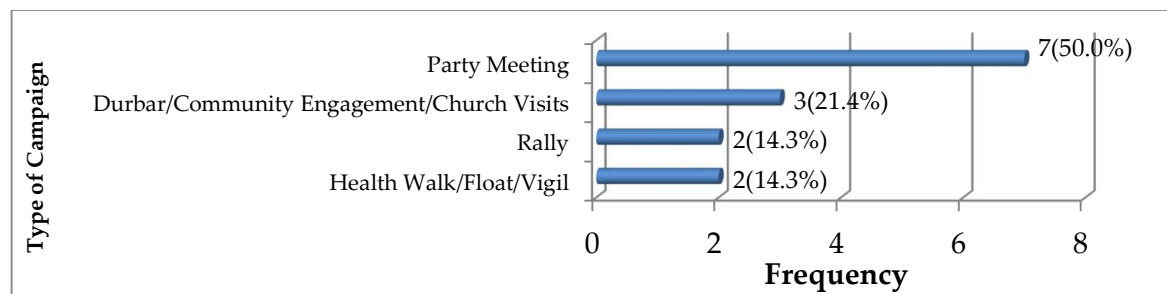


**Figure 4j: Type of Campaign Activities Observed in the North East Region**

A total of 19 various types of campaign activities were observed across 2 constituencies and 9 towns/communities in this region. The breakdown of campaign activities is provided in Figure 4j.

The main campaign activities were in the areas of Rally (78.9%), Party Meetings (15.8%) and Durbar/Community Engagement/Church Visit (5.3%).

### *Oti Region*

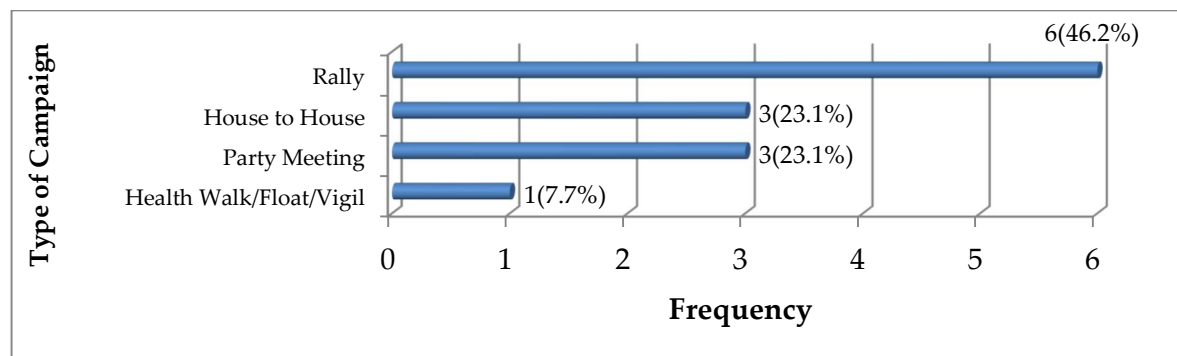


*Figure 4k: Type of Campaign Activities Observed in the Oti Region*

A total of 14 various types of campaign activities were observed across 3 constituencies and 12 towns/communities in this region. The breakdown of campaign activities is provided in Figure 4k.

The main campaign activities were in the areas of Party Meetings (50.0%), Durbar/Community Engagement/Church visit (21.4%), Rally (14.3%) and Health Walk/Float/Vigil (14.3%).

### *Ahafo Region*

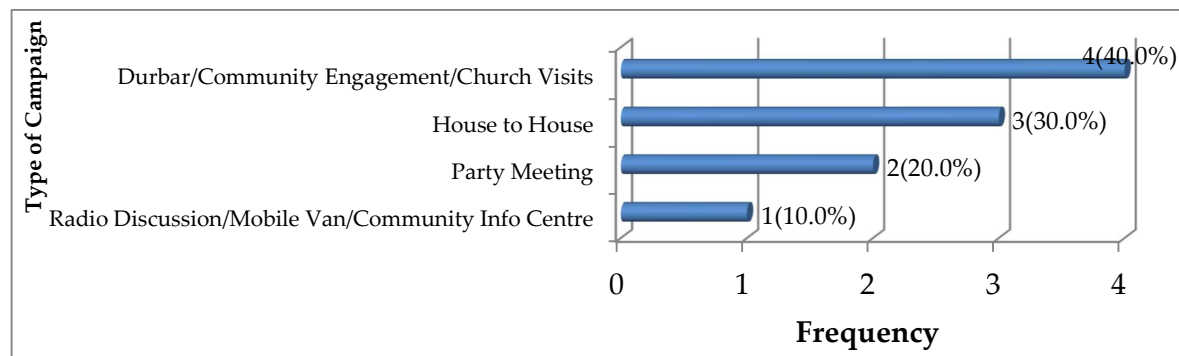


*Figure 4l: Type of Campaign Activities Observed in the Ahafo Region*

In all, 13 campaign activities were observed across 4 constituencies and 6 towns/communities in this region. The breakdown of the type of campaigns is presented in Figure 4l.

The main campaign activities were in the areas of Rally (46.2%), House to House (23.1%) and Party Meetings (23.1%).

### ***Bono -East Region***

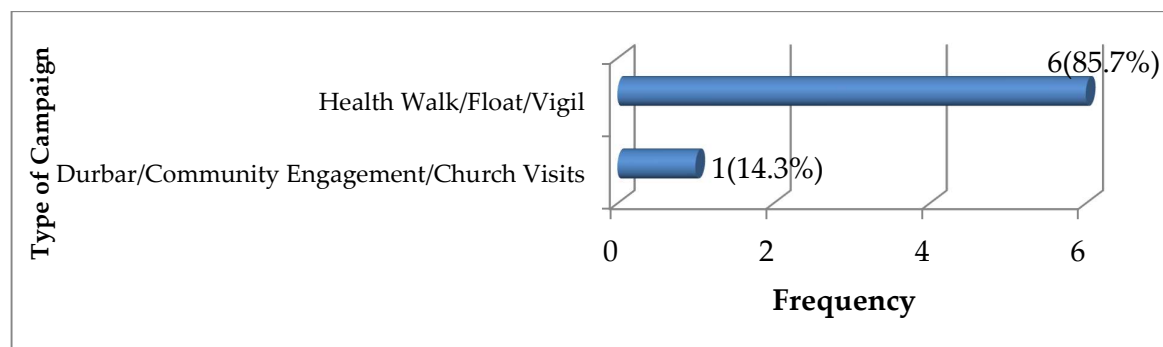


***Figure 4m: Type of Campaign Activities Observed in the Bono East Region***

A total of 10 various types of campaign activities were observed across 4 constituencies and 9 towns/communities in this region. The breakdown of campaign activities is provided in Figure 4m.

The main campaign activities were in the areas of Durbar/Community Engagement/Church Visits (40.0%), House to House (30.0%) and Party Meeting (20.0%).

### ***Western -North Region***

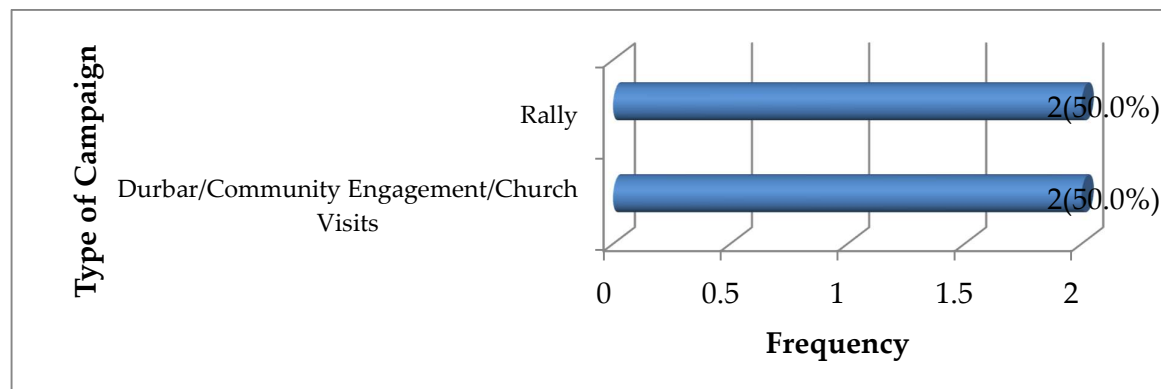


***Figure 4n: Type of Campaign Activities Observed in te Western North Region***

A total of 7 various types of campaign activities were observed across 2 constituencies and 2 towns/communities in this region. The breakdown of campaign activities is provided in Figure 4n.

The main campaign activities were in the areas of Health Walk/Float/Vigil (85.7%) and Durbar/Community Engagement/Church Visit (14.3%).

### *Upper East Region*

A total of 4 various types of campaign activities were observed across 3 constituencies and 3 towns/communities in this region. The breakdown of campaign activities is provided in Figure 4o.

The main campaign activities were in the areas of Rally (50.0%) and Durbar/Community Engagement/Church Visit (50.0%).

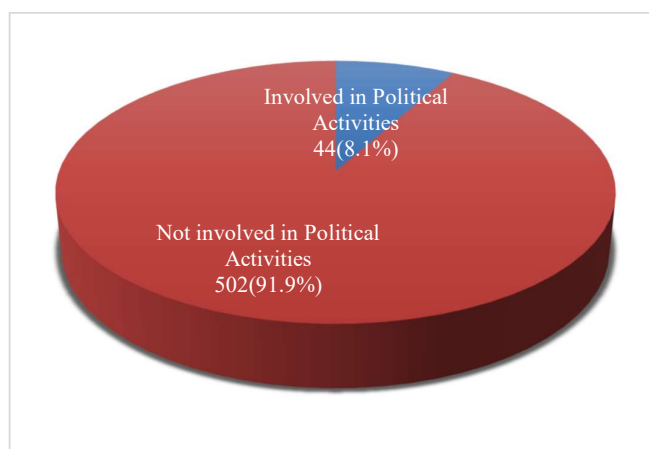
### **2.5.2 Political Rights Issues**

In this section of the observation exercise, political rights issues such as engagement of civil servants and chiefs in political activities, nature of language used (whether insulting or abusive), threats, harassments or intimidations, disrupting of campaign, and the presence of security personnel were assessed. These are discussed in the subsequent sub-sections.

#### *Civil Servants Campaigning*

At 44 (8.1%) of the campaigns observed, civil servants were seen actively participating in the campaign activities (*see Figure 5*).





***Figure 5: Involvement of Civil Servants in Political Activities***

Most of the civil servants observed during the campaign were canvassing for votes for both the presidential and parliamentary candidates. Some also doubled as party executives. Centres where civil servants campaigned for the party and doubled as constituency executives include:

- West Gonja – Attributo (11/16/2020) NDC
- West Gonja – Attributo (11/16/2020) NPP
- West Gonja – Zongo (11/21/2020) NPP
- West Gonja - Nhbaripe (11/20/2020) NDC
- West Gonja – Attributo (11/16/2020) NDC
- West Gonja - Cateen (11/9/2020) NPP
- West Gonja - Attributo (11/15/2020) NPP
- West Gonja - Attributo (11/9/2020) NDC
- West Gonja - Yagbonkura (11/10/2020) NDC
- Asante Akim South – Bogu (11/14/2020) NPP
- Offinso Municipal – Asamankama (11/22/2020) NDC

Other activities the civil servants involved themselves in were enumerated as follows:

- They were the leaders of the campaign teams who explained the government achievements and other policies to the people (Eastern Region- Akuapem North Municipal, 10/11/2020, NPP, House to House).
- Some teachers who were also assembly members affiliated with the NDC were seen wearing party t-shirts and paraphernalia moving from house to house mobilising people to go to the rally ground to meet the former President, His Excellency John Dramani Mahama (Eastern Region - Fanteakwa North District, 11/7/2020).
- Some of them were among the main speakers and one was a Co-Master of Ceremony (MC) at the programme (Central-Assin Nsuta, Hon. Rev. John Ntim Fordjour (NPP), 11/10/2020).
- Two of the speakers at the information centre were public servants, one was the NADMO Co-ordinator at Assin Fosu and the other a Bursar at one of the public Senior High School in Assin (Central Region-Assin Central - Assin Foso (11/27/2020) NPP).

### *Engagement of Chief(s) in Political Activities*

Chiefs were found actively involved in political campaign activities at 4 (0.7%) of the campaigns observed. The campaign activities that the chiefs engaged in include:

- Distributing party fliers (Eastern - New Juaben South – Koforidua (11/11/2020))
- Asking for the beneficiaries to vote for the government in power (Ashanti - Mampong Municipal (11/10/2020)).
- Endorsement/campaigning (Ashanti - Kwabre East Municipal (11/11/2020)).
- Asking electorates to vote massively for the New Patriotic Party candidate as a result of the Free SHS Policy (Ashanti – Sekyere South – Abrakaso (11/15/2020)).

### ***Insulting or Abusive Language used by Campaigners***

At 8 (1.5%) of the 546 campaigns observed, candidates were found using insulting and abusive language. Campaigners (NDC) called their opponents wicked, insensitive and thieves among others at Nalerigu Gambaga (11/30/2020). At other centres, campaigners called their opponents thieves:

- Obuasi West - Kokoteasua, Obuasi (11/28/2020) NPP
- Obuasi West - Lenclay Stadium, Obuasi (12/11/2020) NDC

There was an exchange of words between the Ghana Union Movement (GUM) and NDC parliamentary candidates during a debate organised by the NCCE. The GUM parliamentary candidate in her presentation referred to the NDC parliamentary candidate as "incompetent". This provoked the NDC candidate and in a sharp rebuttal, she also insulted the candidate for GUM as "stupid" in their local language during a parliamentary debate organized by the NCCE on 26<sup>th</sup> November, 2020 at Ada East - Kasseh.

### ***Threats, Harassments or Intimidations During Campaign***

Of the 546 campaigns observed, there was one case of intimidation meted against the NPP party by supporters of an independent candidate at Bekwai Gyasikrom.

“The road was blocked at Asokore to delay them by the supporters of the Independent Candidate (Bekwai Municipal–Gyasikrom (11/20/2020))”

### ***Disruption of Campaigns***

Six (1.1%) of the campaigns observed were disrupted in the process by opposing parties. Some of such disruptions include the following:

- Supporters of the NDC and GUM exchanged words by insulting each other which nearly caused or prompted a brawl during a parliamentary debate organized by the NCCE (Ada – Kasseh (2020/11/26)). Six (6) policemen

immediately came to the scene and were able to calm down tempers for the programme to continue.

- The NPP campaigners were hooted at and brooms were used to sweep them away by a group of women (Bekwai – Koniyaw (11/20/2020)). Some members of the community intervened and condemned the act and allowed the campaign team to continue to other communities for their campaign.

### ***Security Personnel***

There were security personnel present at 144 (26.4%) of the campaigns observed.

The security personnel protected the electorates and ensured that there was peace at the campaign grounds. They also ensured that no one disrupted the programme.

### **2.5.3 Corruption Issues**

In this section of the observation exercise, vote- buying and the use of state or public resources (i.e. government vehicles) were assessed and are discussed in the subsequent sub-sections.

#### ***Vote Buying***

There was vote-buying during 30 (5.5%) of the campaigns observed. Money was usually given to the electorates present to share:

- The party executives gave GH¢700.00 to people present to share at GH¢10.00 each (Akatsi South - Mawunyo Estate (11/18/2020) NPP).
- The MP aspirant asked that the names of 100 women should be written for financial support. He also said each youth group should present 30 people for GH¢500 each. An unknown amount was also given to the women present that night for the durbar (Tamale South - Koblimahu zoo (11/30/2020) NDC).

In some instances, some items were presented to the electorates present:

- Wellington boots, weedicides, cutlasses etc. were distributed by the parliamentary candidate by the name Martin Agyei Korsah (Techiman South (10/25/2020) NPP).

- The party donated 10 sewing machines and an amount of one thousand cedis to the association (Twifo Atti Morkwa - Twifo praso (11/15/2020) NDC).
- Each of the 35 trainees who graduated was given a sewing machine by the party. (Twifo Atti Morkwa - Twifo praso (11/15/2020) NPP).
- Each barbering operator present was given a barbering machine (clipper). In all, 20 clippers were given to them (Twifo Atti Morkwa - Twifo praso (11/29/2020) NPP).

#### ***Use of State or Public Resources (ie., Government Vehicles)***

At 15 (2.7%) of the campaigns observed, campaigners were seen with government vehicles. For instance:

- A Toyota Hilux vehicle embossed with the inscription Assin South District Assembly was at the campaign grounds. This was used by the DCE (Assin South - Assin Nsuta (11/10/2020) (NPP)).
- State vehicles and resources were used when top government officials were coming to support some of the campaign activities (Techiman South (10/25/2020) NPP).
- The District Chief Executive competing for the Ada Constituency parliamentary seat came with a state vehicle to the programme with her supporters (Ada – Kasseh (2020-11-26)).

#### **2.5.4 Commendable Practices**

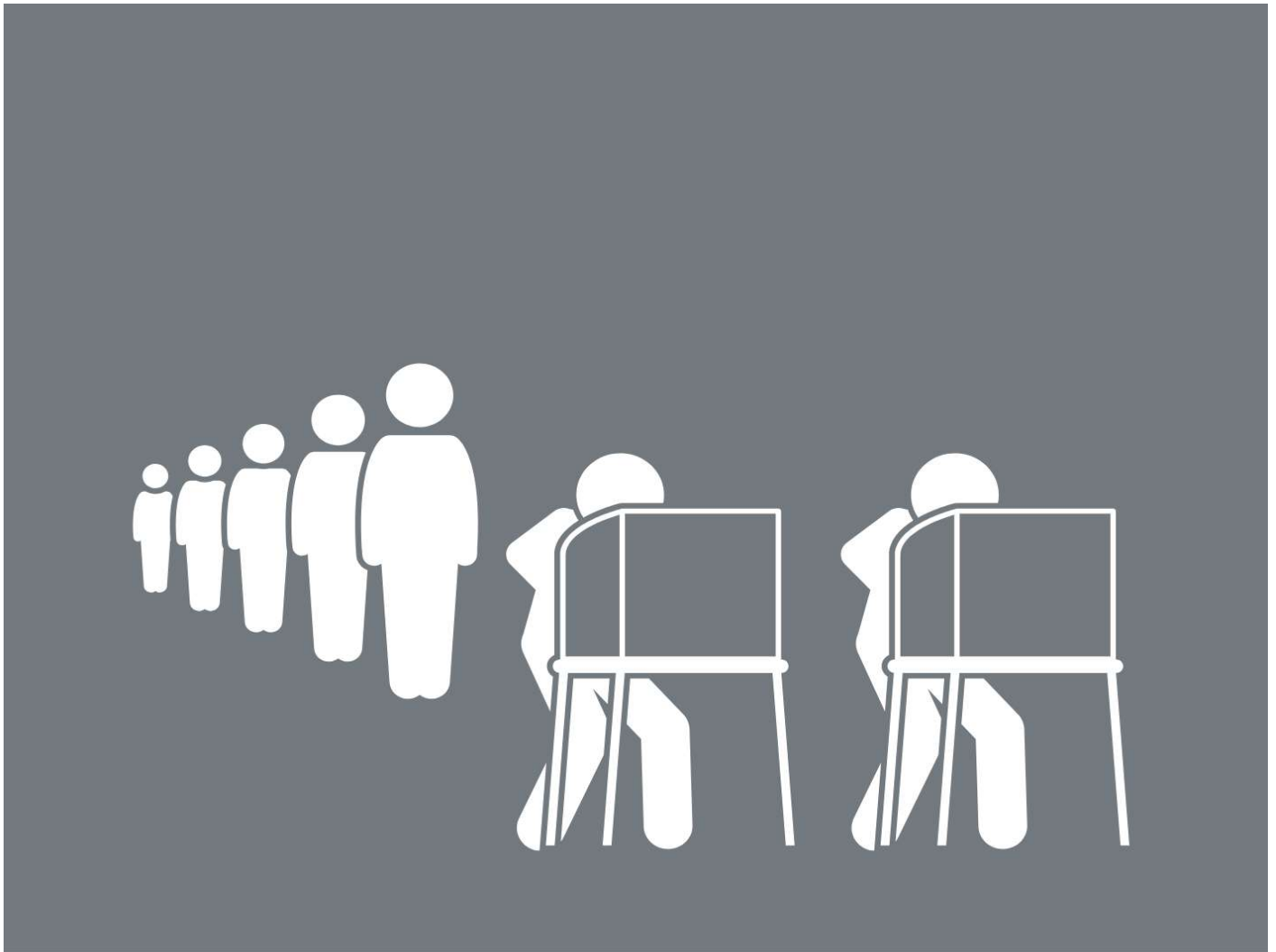
##### ***Adherence to COVID-19 Protocols***

There was strict adherence to COVID-19 protocols at 194 (35.5%) of the campaigns observed. Face masks were mostly worn and hand sanitisers were distributed in some cases.

### ***How to Vote***

Electorates were educated on how to vote during the voting day in order to avoid spoiled and rejected ballot papers.

- Techiman North – Toubodom (11/10/2020) NDC
- Akuapem North Municipal – Akropong (11/30/2020) NPP

## CHAPTER 2

### THE ELECTION DAY

This chapter presents findings from the Election Day observation exercise; this covers Pre -Polls and during Polling stage. At the Pre-Polls stage, the Commission observed, among others, availability of equipment at polling stations and whether or not ballot boxes were sealed before the start of polling. During the polling process, the Commission observed the general atmosphere, arrangements made for persons in vulnerable situation, issues of security, corruption and the COVID-19 risk mitigating strategies employed by the polling stations.

At the Pre-Polls stage, the Commission received 312 responses while 298 responses were received during polling from all the polling stations (See Appendix 4 for list of polling stations) observed across all 16 regions.

### 3.1 Pre - Polls

#### 3.1.1 Equipment For Polling Stations

Generally, the distribution of electoral materials such as certified copy of the voters' registers and biometric stamps, were available at all polling stations observed as at the time polling started. However, validating stamps were not available at the Nawariya E/A (M1313067) polling station in the Northern Region and M/A Primary School (F180201) polling station in Ashanti Region.

A considerable number 277 (88.8%) of polling stations visited indicated the availability of tactile braille at the time polling started while thirty-five (35) polling stations representing 11.2% stated otherwise. The majority of these stations without tactile braille were in the Greater Accra (12), followed by Eastern (5) and the Central Region (5). Northern and Western North Regions had the least of one (1) each. The majority 219 (70.2%) of the polling stations visited proved that there were other voting materials like a large print display version of the ballot paper for the visually impaired



person. Nonetheless, 93 (29.8%) of the polling stations visited revealed unavailability of other voting materials for visually impaired persons and these were mainly from the Greater Accra (28), Eastern (14), Central (11) and Ashanti Region (10). Additionally, a least of one (1) each was recorded by the Ahafo, North East, Savannah and Volta Regions.

## 3.2 During Polling

### 3.2.1 General Atmosphere

A substantial number 215 (72.1%) of polling stations began polling at the scheduled time (7:00am). However, 83 (27.9%) indicated polling could not start at the said time, of which the majority were in the Greater Accra region (49.4%), Central Region (10.8%) and Eastern Region (9.6%). Some of the common reasons for this effect are as mentioned below:

- Delay in the arrival of voting materials and equipment;
- Delay in setting-up and sorting of electoral materials;
- All the requisite items were brought except the thumb pads and two legs of one screen;
- The verification of the items by the party agents was not done on time;
- The presiding officer had difficulty identifying the serial numbers at the beginning;
- There were three (3) polling stations at one centre and this caused voters to move between the three (3) to verify their names before voting;
- Distance from the EC office to a polling station and
- EC officials slow in filling forms.

### 3.2.2 Situation of Voting Booths

Two hundred and ninety-two (292) polling stations representing 98.0% had their voting booths situated in a way that enhanced the secrecy of the voting process. Only six (6) representing 2.0% said otherwise and gave reasons such as:

- The voting booth was close to the queue so someone in the queue could see whatever was going on in the booth;
- Bystanders could see a voter's choice.

### 3.2.3 Ballot Box Within Everyone's Sight

It was observed in 296 (99.3%) of polling stations visited that, ballot boxes were within public view at all times. Only a few (2) polling stations representing 0.67% did not have the boxes within public view at all the time. These instances were observed in the Pentecost church two streams (E050404) and St. Dominic Primary School Adweso 2 (E050203) polling stations all in the Eastern Region. This was because the ballot box placed in a building where the polling was on-going was within the view of those voting but not the general public. Also, there were heavy rains and the booth had to be moved.

### 3.2.4 Persons in Vulnerable Situations

Separate arrangements were made for the following groups:

#### **a. Arm or Leg Impaired**

Arrangements to enable persons with arm or leg impairments to vote were provided in 227 (76.2%) of polling stations visited. In 71 (23.8%) of these stations, however, no provisions were made. The majority of these stations were in the Greater Accra (29), followed by Eastern Region with eight (8) polling stations. The Savannah Region recorded the least number of one (1).

**b. Visually Impaired**

The majority (246) polling stations representing 82.6% indicated separate arrangements were made for the visually impaired persons while 52 (17.4%) indicated there were no separate arrangements for these groups and these were from Greater Accra Region (24). Oti, Upper West and Western Regions recorded the least of one (1) each.

**c. Hearing Impaired**

In the majority 207 (69.7%) of the polling stations visited separate provisions were made for the hearing impaired. However, 91 (30.5%) of these stations made no provision for them and were mainly from the Greater Accra (41) while the least recorded two (2) each from Oti, Savannah, Upper West and the Volta Regions.

**d. Elderly (75 years and above)**

Concerning persons who were 75 years and above, 257 polling stations representing 86.2% indicated there were separate arrangements for this group while the rest (41) representing 13.8% said otherwise. The majority of these stations were in the Greater Accra (16), followed by Northern Regions with five (5) polling stations. Oti, Volta, Western and Western North Regions had a least of one (1) each.

**e. Pregnant Women**

Two hundred and forty-nine (83.6%) polling stations visited had made provisions for pregnant and nursing women while 49 (16.4%) stations had no provisions and these were mainly from Greater Accra (20). The least recorded one (1) each from the Oti and Western Regions.

**f. Types of Arrangements made for Persons in a Vulnerable Situation**

The following were some of the common arrangements made for persons in vulnerable situations:

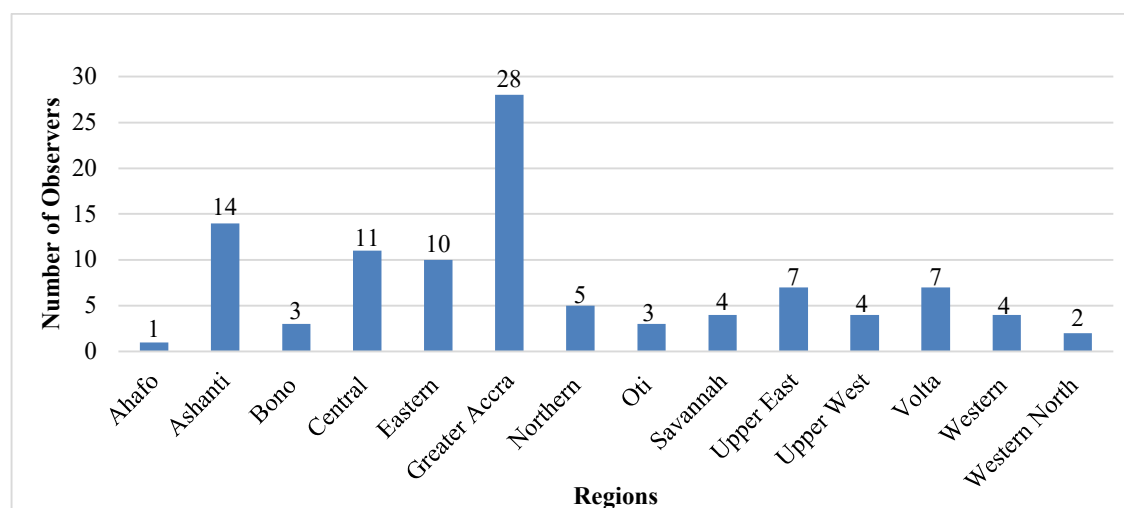
- Chairs were provided and they were attended to promptly;
- They were assisted to vote without joining the queue;
- They were given preferential treatment. Thus, they were allowed to vote as soon as they arrived at the polling station;
- A separate queue was formed for the elderly and they were attended to before other voters. Arm and leg impaired persons were given seats while the presiding officer assisted them to check for the names, verification and to vote;
- There was a large display of ballot paper for the visually impaired.

### ***Tactile Braille***

Thirty-five (35) polling stations (11.7%) from 9 regions were without a tactile jacket. Reportedly, these centres without the tactile braille/jacket did not have persons with sight impairments.

### **Vulnerable Persons Interviewed**

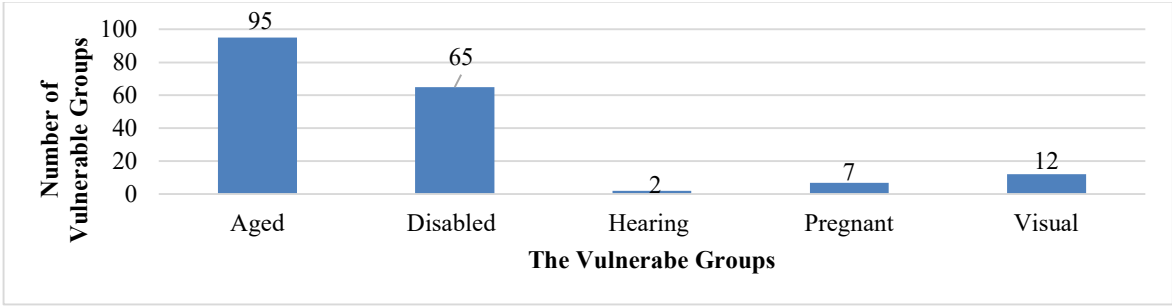

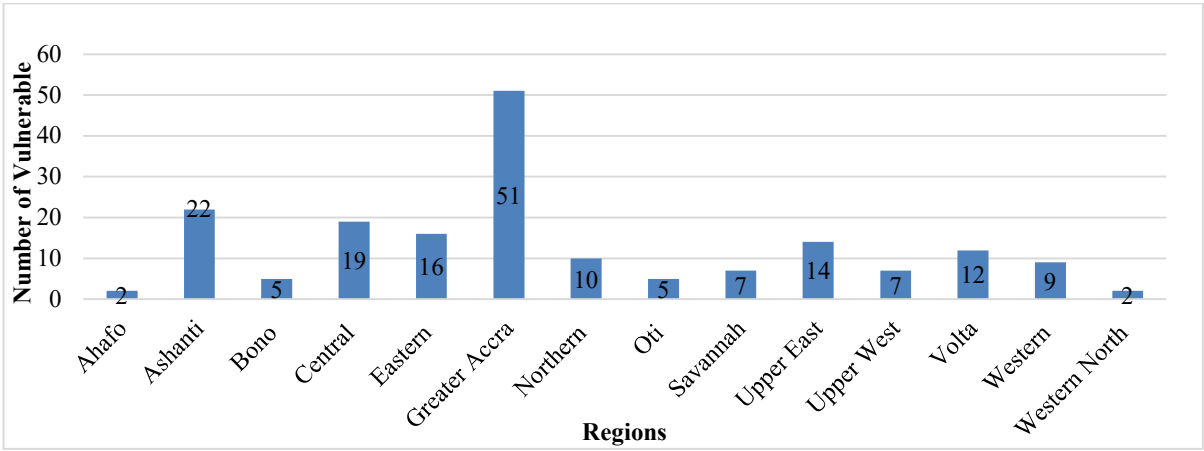
***Figure 6: Election Observers who interviewed the Vulnerable***

The observers interviewed a minimum of two vulnerable persons (the aged, and persons with physical disabilities) within each polling station observed to find out their voting experience. Figure 6 depicts 103 observers who interviewed the vulnerable in this exercise.

The Greater Accra region had the highest number of observers who interviewed the vulnerable whereas one observer in the Ahafo region conducted such an interview (Figure 6).

A total of 181 vulnerable persons consisting of 97 (53.6%) male and 84 (46.4%) female from the 103<sup>43</sup> polling stations were interviewed across the 16 regions. These vulnerable persons include the aged, visually impaired persons, hearing impaired, persons with physical disabilities, pregnant and nursing women (see Figure 7).

From Figure 8, the highest number of the vulnerable interviewed was in the Greater Accra Region whereas the least was recorded in the Ahafo and the Western North Regions.

### ***Voting Process***

The majority 173 (95.5%) of vulnerable groups interacted with stated that the voting process was smooth without hindrances whereas a few 8(4.4%) respondents stated that, they experienced some challenges.

### ***Smooth Process***

Of the 173 (95.5%) of the vulnerable persons interacted with expressed their satisfaction with the smooth voting process. Sixty-six indicated that that they were provided preferential treatment such as jumping the queues and provision of some form of assistance to vote.

### **Views of Vulnerable Persons**

Responses from vulnerable persons suggest that they did not encounter any challenge in the voting process. Some of the responses include;

“I did not encounter any challenge and the voting process was simple and smooth for me”, *A 79-year-old woman, Central E.P.JHS 'A' Ho-Kpodzi.*

“I am happy about the system in place because I did not waste time when voting”. *Physically challenged man, 50 years, Central E.P.JHS 'A' Ho-Kpodzi*

“The process was smooth and I am happy about how I was attended to quickly”. *A pregnant woman, 34 years, Ablekuma West swag Club, Greater Accra.*

“The process went well for me since I was not stressed and also was well attended to and left the polling centre 10 minutes after arriving”. *A pregnant woman, 40 years, Sky-high pep school Ashongman, Greater Accra.*

“The arrangement the EC made for us the vulnerable to vote is very good and we are very grateful to the EC”. *A hearing- impaired woman, a 54-year, R/C Primary School, Tali 2, Tolon, Northern Region.*

“I was impressed with the electoral process”. *A hearing -impaired man, 57 years, Loho Primary polling station with polling number Nadowli-Kaleo constituency, Upper West.*

“I voted using the tactile braille and did not encounter any challenge”. *Visually impaired person, 60-year-old, Nock Chemist Polling centre, in the Western Region.*

“I am happy with the process because I was able to vote with ease”. *Visually impaired male, 61 years, Presby Primary school, Wirenkyiren, Polling centre, in the Eastern Region.*

“I was able to cast my vote with the help of my sister and the process was smooth”. *Visually impaired man, 62 years, R/C Primary School Jamasi, in the Ashanti Region.*

“I was able to cast my vote successfully”. *Visually impaired female, 30-year-old, Suhum, government hospital polling centre, Eastern Region.*

The only two hearing impaired persons interviewed said the process was smooth for them.

### ***Preferential Treatment***

Some views of respondents stating they were given preferential treatment at the polling station include;

“I am satisfied with the preferential service given me by the electoral officers and because of that I spent less than 5 minutes during the process of casting my vote”. *Physically impaired female, 41 years, District Assembly Hall Western North Region.*

“I was made to vote early and got home in time otherwise I would still be at the polling station for people to be looking at me...”. *Physically challenged female (amputee), 37 years, Wa Central Central Prisons polling centre.*

“I was treated fairly and was allowed to jump the queue and cast my vote”. *Physically challenged person, West Mankranso Methodist primary B, Ashanti Region.*

“I am impressed with the preferential services given me as to not joining the long queue”. *A physically challenged woman, 56 years, Cape Coast South Castle 1.*

## ***Challenges***

Eight (4.4%) of the vulnerable interacted<sup>44</sup> with stated that they experienced some challenges. Four visually impaired could not vote with the tactile braille (in three of the instances, voters found it difficult to use, while in the other instance, it was not available), whereas the other four indicated they were not given preferential treatment.

### ***Challenges Expressed by the Physically Impaired Persons***

Challenges expressed by the physically impaired persons include;

“I found the setup at the polling station inconveniencing as I had to climb into the building to be able to vote”. *A physically challenged person, St. Dominic Primary School Adweso 2, New Juaben South*

“The process was cumbersome for me and I wish it could be simplified in the future.” *Physically challenged man, 49 years, Kwabre East Municipal Education Office-Mamponteng, Ashanti Region*

“I could not fold the ballot papers after marking my choice” *Physically challenged man, 44 years, Wa Central Community Borehole, Tamarimuni B, Upper West*

### ***Challenges expressed by the Aged***

Two elderly persons, a man and a woman said that they were not assisted in the voting process.

The support provided me was unacceptable as I joined the queue till I cast my vote”. *Elderly woman, 80 years, At the Wenchi Nchirafufie polling centre*

### *Challenges Expressed by the Visually Impaired*

The concerns of the visually impaired at the polling centres included:

- No knowledge on how to use the tactile braille; those with knowledge still had difficulties in using it; and
- The unavailability of tactile brailles at some polling centres.

“Using the tactile braille to vote was difficult for me as that was my first time using it.” *Visually impaired woman, 74 years, Kwabre east municipal education Office, polling centre, Ashanti Region.*

“I could not use the tactile braille to vote so my grandson was allowed to assist me”. *Visually impaired woman, 89 years, Kwabre east municipal education Office, polling centre, Ashanti Region.*

Concerns and dissatisfaction about the unavailability of the tactile braille for the visually impaired was also provided by a male respondent;

“When I requested for it, I was told by the EC officials that it was not provided”. *Visually impaired man, 66 years, SDA Church Boadan, Wenchi, polling centre.*

He however stated that he was later assisted by the EC officials to vote successfully.

### **3.2.5 Challenges of persons with low literacy during the voting process**

At the majority 238 (79.9%) of polling stations visited, persons with low literacy had no challenges during the voting process, whereas 60 (20.1%) stations indicated otherwise. The majority of these polling stations were from the Greater Accra (16) followed by Central Region (11) while Bono East, Upper West and Western North Regions recorded the least of one (1) each. Some of the common challenges encountered by these persons include:

- Most of them could not distinguish between the presidential and parliamentary ballot boxes;
- Some stood behind the voting booth and threw the ballot paper in the ballot box;
- They mostly had difficulty understanding the process involved in casting one's vote;
- Some of them found it difficult to identify their choice of candidates on the ballot paper;
- How to fold back the ballot sheet into the ballot box after the thumbprint;
- They did not know where to cast their vote after collecting their ballot paper and how to thumbprint on the ballot paper;
- Some did not know what to do with the ballot paper.

#### *How these Challenges were Resolved*

- Presiding officers took time to explain the voting processes to them;
- Presiding officers assisted them to cast their vote;
- This category of voters were assisted to understand the voting steps;
- Explanations were given to first- time voters regarding steps in voting (e.g., presidential voting followed by parliamentary);
- The presiding officers at the polling centres explained to them how to vote properly by thumb printing on only one candidate;
- The security personnel on duty assisted most of them to cast their votes,
- Presiding officers assisted by demonstrating how to fold the ballot paper before putting it into the box.

#### **3.2.6 Security**

At the majority 291(97.7%) of the polling centres, there were security personnel present to maintain peace and order. All of them were easily identifiable in their uniforms. There were no plain cloth security personnel identified at any of the centres.

At the few (7) polling centres without security personnel, it emerged that, security personnel were patrolling those polling centres but had not been particularly assigned to specific centres. The polling centres patrolled include; *Top Church – Tepa, F460105, Ahafo Ano North Municipal, Ashanti Region*), (*Mallam Town-A070610, Essikado Ketan, Western Region*) and (*DA Primary School-Mbanaayilli-2, M161803, Kumbungu District, Northern region*).

At the EP Primary School polling centre, M080104, Saboba District in the Northern region, it was found out that no security personnel had been deployed there.

### 3.2.7 Corruption

#### *Treating*

There was no incidence of treating of voters at any of the polling centres observed except at NOBISCO A1 polling centres (M141312A) in the Tamale North Constituency of the Northern Region where food in black polythene bags loaded in a tricycle (motor king) was shared among voters by persons, who were however not in party paraphernalia.

#### *Vote- Buying*

There was no incidence of vote-buying in any of the polling centers observed. However, there were few instances where party agents (of NPP and NDC) were seen giving money claimed to be transportation fare for those who came to vote.

For instance, at the Benin Catholic JHS 2 polling centre (B153201 and B153202) in the Asikuma Odoben Brakwa district of the Central region, NPP party agents were seen giving out money to voters purported to be transportation fare. Also, at Mallam town polling centre with code A070610 of Essikado Ketan in the Western Region, some party agents were seen giving transportation fares to those who commuted from outside the district to vote.

### 3.2.8 Incidents Recorded

The following noteworthy incidents were recorded:

- A fight ensued between some prospective voters leading to a temporary suspension of the voting process at the Wa Central Mosque 1 Polling Centre (P010801).
- Heavy rains disrupted voting at the polling centres at PTC Hall Tobacco Block, Akatsi South, and the Presby Upper Primary School, Obosomase in the Akuapem North.
- Biometric verification machines malfunctioned temporarily at the Suhum Government Hospital Polling Center and the Korupe Mosque polling Centre.
- At the Cocoa Shed, Afere 1 polling station in the Western North in Juaboso, some young people refused to leave the polling station after they had cast their votes. Their presence and seeming refusal to leave prevented other electorates from getting access to the polling station. The security officer called for the patrol team who brought the situation under control.
- One person attempted to vote twice at the Beauty of Nature polling station with polling code E 211409 in Denkyembour in the Eastern region.

### 3.2.9 COVID-19 Risk Mitigating Strategies

Almost all the centres observed COVID-19 risk mitigating strategies including: social/physical distancing, wearing of face masks, regular use of hand sanitisers, washing of hands with soap under running water, checking of temperature with thermometer guns, and the wiping of biometric machines before fingerprint verification.

#### *Social/Physical Distancing*

The majority (91.6%) of the centres visited, had EC officials duly following social/physical distancing among themselves. However, social/physical distancing was hardly enforced among voters at 104 (34.9%) of the polling centres.

### ***Wearing of Face Mask***

During the time of visit, the majority (98.3%) of the EC officials were in their nose masks. all officers were in face masks and hand sanitisers were made available for use. The remaining (5) had their facemasks but did not wear it. EC officials of 96.6% of the centres strictly ensured that voters were in facemasks before allowed to cast their votes.

### ***Hand Sanitizing***

EC officials of the majority (90.3%) of the centres intermittently used the hand sanitisers during the voting process. However, some of the officers wore hand gloves, hence did not sanitize their hands intermittently.

Again, 81.5% of the centres ensured voters sanitized their hands before leaving the centre.

### ***Hand Washing***

The majority (97.3%) of centres visited had soap and running water for washing of hands. The officials ensured that voters washed their hands before going through the voting exercise.

### ***Use of Temperature Guns***

With regard to thermometer guns, the majority (96.6%) of the centres had a functional thermometer gun for use whereas the remaining either had a malfunctioning temperature gun or provision was not made at all.

For instance, at JHS Tamatoku 2 with centre code C310402 in the Ada East District, the presiding officer pointed out that the centre was not supplied with a temperature gun. Also at Vessel of Grace Edu Centre (C160809) Ablekuma North, there were no batteries for the temperature gun at the start of polls, so it took a while before they started to check for the temperatures of potential voters.

## CHAPTER 3

### POST-ELECTORAL PHASE

This chapter presents in detail findings from the post-electoral phase. It includes voters in queues after 5pm, vote counting, security presence during vote counting, rejected ballots as observed from polling centres, as well as news regarding peaceful, free and fair elections, reported post-electoral violence, investigations into post-electoral violence, declarations of results by the EC, results clarification by the EC, election petition, inauguration and swearing-in of President culled out from the newspapers.

#### 4.1. Voters in Queues after 5pm

One hundred and ten (110) constituting 36.9% of the polling centres observed had voters in queue, waiting to cast their vote after 5:00 pm. All voters in the queue were however allowed to vote.

Voters were admitted into the queue after 5:00 pm at 12 of the polling centres observed. The list of centres and number of voters admitted is presented in Table 1.

The last vote cast at the centres observed ranged between 4:30 pm (Lawra - Temp. Booth Baazing (PO82202)) and 10:00 pm (Wa central - Nakori primary 2 (P011701))

## 4.2 Vote Counting

At all the centres observed (except for three where observers were not stationed), the counting of votes and declaration of results was made at the polling centres.

## 4.3 Security Presence During Vote Counting

The majority (96.3%) of the centres were with security official during vote count and declaration. Centres that were without security presence during vote-counting is presented in Table 2.

Two hundred and forty- two (242) of the centres observed witnessed other accredited observers aside CHRAJ.

#### 4.4 Rejected Ballots

A total of 618 rejected ballots across 106 polling stations were recorded. This represents 0.2% of 303204 ballots cast across 283 polling centres.

#### 4.5 Peaceful, Free and Fair Elections

CHRAJ described the December 7, 2020, general election as free, fair and transparent<sup>45</sup>. The NCCE and CODEO also expressed their satisfaction with the conduct and management of the presidential and parliamentary elections<sup>46</sup>. The EC also described the 2020 election as a historic one<sup>47</sup>. The Daily graphic had five (6) news items on this, the Ghanaian Times, three (3), the Mirror and Spectator none.

Table 4 shows the number of times the various newspapers; Daily Graphic, Ghanaian Times, Mirror and Spectator reported the outcome reports on peace after the polls.

## 4.6 Reported Post-Electoral Violence

The Inspector-General of Police (IGP), said 61 cases of electoral and post-electoral incidents were recorded nationwide out of which 21 were true cases of electoral violence; six involving gunshot incidents, resulting in five deaths<sup>48</sup>.

## 4.7 Investigations Into Post- Electoral Violence

The chairman of the National Peace Council (NPC) urged the national elections security to respond appropriately to post-electoral violence that had been reported<sup>49</sup>. To this, the National Election Security Task Force (NESTF) gave its word that the reported 2020 election violence were being investigated<sup>50</sup>. Similarly, the IGP stated that all electoral violence, including the killing of 5 persons during the 2020 polls, will be thoroughly investigated<sup>51</sup>.

## 4.8 Declaration of Election Results By The EC

The EC chairperson declared President Nana Akufo-Addo as the winner of the 2020 presidential elections with 6,730,413 representing 51.595% of the total valid votes cast<sup>52</sup>.

## 4.9 Results Clarification by the EC

According to the Daily Graphic (1) and Ghanaian Times (1), the EC came out to correct the total figure of valid votes cast for the 2020 presidential election, indicating that it is 13,119,640 and not 13,433,573. It however did not change the percentages stated for each candidate<sup>53</sup>.

#### 4.10 Election Petition

The declaration however received a rejection by the opposition party, the NDC<sup>54</sup> and a petition was filed at the Supreme Court on the 30<sup>th</sup> December 2020. The Justices of the Supreme Court stated in a ruling<sup>55</sup> that the validity of the declaration by the Electoral Commission on 9<sup>th</sup> December 2020 could not be discounted as the petitioner's allegations were not backed with enough tangible evidence.

#### 4.11 Inauguration And Swearing- In Of President

The seventh parliament was dissolved at midnight of January 6, 2021 and President Nana Akufo-Addo sworn into office on January 7, 2021<sup>56</sup>.

## CHAPTER 4

### CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This chapter presents conclusions drawn from the exercises conducted and recommendations for stakeholders to implement so that persons in vulnerable situations fully enjoy their right to vote.

#### 5.1 Conclusion

The conduct of elections was generally well organized. The report has however documented some challenges with respect to the three phases that were observed, and which would require attention during subsequent election years.

##### 5.1.1 Voter Registration

- Shortage of materials such as indelible ink, cartridges etc.;
- Incidents of disruptions, such as misunderstanding between agents of political parties; present that had the potential of preventing prospective applicants from registering;
- Non-functional temperature guns or non-availability of temperature guns;
- The inability of people with low literacy levels to provide key information for their registration.

##### 5.1.2 Campaigns

- Usage of insults and abusive language.

##### 5.1.3 Voting Day

- Late commencement of polls;
  - Non-availability of tactile braille to persons with visual impairments
  - Little or no knowledge about the use of tactile braille by some visually impaired persons
  - Some physically challenged persons not being able to fold the ballot paper

- Some polling stations inaccessible to persons with physical disabilities;
- Little or no knowledge by persons with low literacy on what to do from one step to the other during the voting process.

The Commission commends the EC officials and the people of Ghana for contributing to the general success of the 2020 elections. Reports gathered from CODEO, the NCCE and other notable institutions following the elections also indicated that the process was free, fair and transparent.

Nevertheless, CHRAJ deplores the acts of violence that took place on Election Day resulting in some deaths and looks forward to investigations being expedited to ensure that perpetrators are held accountable and that such acts are prevented in subsequent election years.

The Commission recommends that the EC collaborates with relevant actors including CHRAJ to implement recommendations in this report towards ensuring the fulfilment of the right to vote of vulnerable persons during subsequent election years.

## 5.2 Recommendations

### 5.2.1 Pre-electoral Phase

#### *Voter Registration*

1. Reported cases of violence, disorderly behaviours and intimidation at registration centres must be investigated by the Ghana Police Service (GPS) in collaboration with the EC and the culprits prosecuted accordingly to serve as a deterrent to others.

The EC should in subsequent registration exercises:

2. Provide adequate materials to all centres;
3. Ensure persons whose fingerprints cannot be captured by the biometric machines are offered the opportunity to register through other means such as facial recognition;

4. Ensure that all centres are accessible to PWDs. Centres situated in classrooms or buildings with high staircase(s) should not be used. A setup with tents outside these classrooms or buildings should serve as alternatives to ensure easy accessibility.

### *Campaigns*

1. Political parties in collaboration with the security agencies should always ensure the presence of security personnel at all their campaign activities;
2. Political parties are encouraged to use sign language interpreters during their campaign programs;
3. Regional Coordinating Councils and District Assemblies should ensure that state resources especially vehicles are not used for political campaigns;
4. The EC and NCCE should increase their efforts at educating the public that vote buying amounts to electoral offence;
5. The National/Regional Houses of Chiefs should ensure that its members abide strictly by the tenets of the 1992 Constitution of the Republic of Ghana (Article 276) that prohibits chiefs from publicly engaging in partisan politics. Again, the National House of Chiefs should investigate and take appropriate action in respect of chief(s) found to have publicly engaged in partisan politics prior to the 2020 general election to serve as a deterrent;
6. CHRAJ and the Public Services Commission (PSC) should continue to enforce the public service code of conduct during the campaign process;
7. To prevent the use of insulting and abusive language while campaigning, CHRAJ urges all party leaders to strictly adhere to the political party's code of conduct voluntarily developed by the parties themselves. The political parties code of conduct should also be strengthened and made legally binding with corresponding penalties for violations of the code;
8. All acts of violence and intimidation must be investigated by the GPS in collaboration with the EC and the culprits prosecuted.

### 5.2.2 Election Day

#### Recommendations

1. The security agencies (i.e. the GPS) in collaboration with the EC must investigate all election-related violence and take appropriate actions to serve as a deterrent.  
The EC should in subsequent registration exercises:
2. Provide adequate electoral materials to all polling stations before polling starts.
3. Provide tactile braille at all polling centres and enhance the training of its use.
4. Ensure that all centres are accessible to PWDs. Centres situated in classrooms or buildings with high staircase(s) should not be used. A setup with tents outside these classrooms or buildings should serve as alternatives to ensure easy accessibility;
5. Set up call centres or hotlines where cases of political violence, discrimination, lack of preferential treatment against pregnant women and nursing mothers, as well as the elderly can be reported<sup>57</sup>;
6. Provide data on the number and location of the vulnerable persons;
7. Collaborate with the NCCE and other relevant stakeholders, intensify public education of the electorates on voting and its procedures as well as the canker of electoral offences;
8. Task political parties to educate electorates on voting and its procedures as well as the canker of electoral offences;
9. Enforce the political parties' code of conduct<sup>58</sup> to ensure problem-free and faultless electoral process.

### 5.2.3 Post-Electoral Phase

#### **Recommendations**

1. The EC should investigate polling stations that admitted voters after 5:00 pm.
2. The GPS in collaboration with the EC should investigate all incidents of violence reported by other observers and the media houses to consolidate issues of trust and confidence in the state apparatus for resolving conflict.
3. The EC and the Security Agencies must ensure the presence of security persons during vote counting at all the polling stations.
4. The EC and NCCE should intensify public education to the electorates on voting and its procedures to reduce the incidents of spoilt or rejected ballots.
5. The EC should encourage political parties to intensify public education to the electorates on voting and its procedures to reduce the incidents of spoilt or rejected ballots.

## Appendix 8 : Interim Report

### **INTERIM REPORT ON THE 2020 PRESIDENTIAL AND PARLIAMENTARY ELECTIONS BY THE COMMISSION ON HUMAN RIGHTS AND ADMINISTRATIVE JUSTICE**

Fellow Countrymen, International and Domestic Observers, as you are all aware, our country held its Eighth Presidential and Parliamentary Elections since returning to Constitutional rule in 1992 on Monday, 7<sup>th</sup> December 2020.

The Commission on Human Rights and Administrative Justice deployed 279 observers on December 7, 2020, made up of 41 Roaming and 238 Non-Roaming Observers.

Roaming Observers had oversight of a number of identified hotspots. Non-Roaming Observers, on the other hand, were stationed at Polling Centres where they observed proceedings at those Polling Centres from the commencement of polls to counting of votes at those Centres. The Observers, both Roaming and Non-roaming, then submitted reports via an online link to CHRAJ's Coordinating Centre.

The main objective for undertaking this exercise is to enhance inclusiveness in the promotion and protection of citizens' right to vote with particular focus on groups or persons in vulnerable situations.

For this year, the Commission's mandate to monitor the right to vote under the 1992 Constitution was carried out in three phases, namely: the pre-election phase, election day and post-election phase. However, the preliminary findings that we are presenting to you relate only to the 7<sup>th</sup> December 2020 election day activities. Although this report was ready on the 9<sup>th</sup>, we decided to share it on 10<sup>th</sup> December, it being the International Human Rights Day.

Before I proceed, I would like to reiterate that the Commission has an important role derived from its constitutional mandate to monitor the Right to Vote and to promote free and fair elections devoid of corruption and human rights violations. And this is not the first time that the Commission is embarking on this exercise.

In line with its mandate, the Commission has observed and assessed the conduct of presidential and parliamentary elections since 2008.

The Commission received reports on the observation exercise from more than 274 observers from 16 regions, 198 constituencies, 211 districts and 303 polling centres. The Greater Accra Region constituted the highest number (30.2%) of Polling Centres the Commission observed, followed by Ashanti Region (10.5%). North East Region formed the least (0.93%).

These are highlights of observations on the day of the election, **7<sup>th</sup> December 2020**.

1. All polling stations (100%) observed had a certified copy of voters register.
2. Two polling stations (0.66%) from two regions observed did not have stamps for validating the ballot papers.
3. All polling stations (100%) observed had biometric verification equipment.
4. Ballot boxes were displayed as empty before polling started at all the polling stations observed.
5. All ballot boxes were sealed after it was shown to be empty. The ballot boxes were also placed in full view of the public.

#### **Treatment Accorded to Persons in Vulnerable Situations**

6. Almost all the polling centres observed by the Commission provided special assistance to the elderly, pregnant, persons carrying babies and PWDs to vote without having to wait in the queues. However, a few polling centres did not do so.

- a. At the Kaare Polling Centres (R080703) in the Talensi District of the Upper East Region, three elderly women aged over 65 years were not accorded the preference to vote. The CHRAJ observer prompted the electoral officer who subsequently allowed them to vote without queuing.
- b. At the Traditional council 1B polling station (B100101) in the Awutu Effutu Senya District in the Central Region, a number of elderly persons and seemingly visibly pregnant women were located in the queue. One elderly person fainted in the queue and was given attention. Chairs were provided and a separate queue created for vulnerable persons when the CHRAJ observer drew the attention of the presiding officer.

### **Tactile Braille**

7. Thirty-five (35) polling stations (11.6%) from 9 regions were without a tactile jacket. Reportedly, these Centres without the tactile braille/jacket did not have persons with sight impairments.

### **Incidents Recorded**

The following noteworthy incidents were recorded:

8. A fight ensued between some prospective voters leading to a temporary suspension of the voting process at the Wa Central Mosque 1 Polling Centre (P010801).
9. Heavy rains disrupted voting at the polling Centres at PTC Hall Tobacco Block, Akatsi South, and the Presby Upper Primary School, Obosomase in the Akuapem North.
10. Biometric verification machines malfunctioned temporarily at the Suhum Government Hospital polling Centre and the Korupe Mosque polling Centre, but these were quickly rectified.
11. At the Cocoa Shed, Afere 1 polling station in the Western North in Juaboso, some young people refused to leave the polling station after they had cast their votes.

Their presence and seeming refusal to leave prevented other electorates from getting access to the polling station. The security officer called for the patrol team who brought the situation under control.

12. One person attempted to vote twice at the Beauty of Nature polling station with polling code E 211409 in Denkyembour in the Eastern region.

### **COVID-19 Risk Mitigating Strategies**

13. The observation exercise sought to ascertain whether the EC officials and voters duly observed the COVID-19 protocols.
14. Except social/physical distancing the COVID-19 protocols were respected in all the centres visited. This includes:
  - a) Wearing of face mask/shield
  - b) Use of temperature guns
  - c) Washing of hands with soap under running water before voting and
  - d) Hands sanitizing

### **After Polling**

15. The exercise further sought to ascertain whether potential voters were not disenfranchised and counting of results were made in public.
16. One hundred (100) out of the 276 polling centres observed had voters in queue waiting to vote after 5:00 pm. All the voters in the queue were allowed to vote.
17. Votes were counted and declared openly and transparently at the 276 polling centres observed.

### ***Security***

18. The majority 270(89.1%) of the polling centres observed had security officers who were easily identifiable (in their uniform) to maintain peace and order. However, five (5) of the centres observed had no security personnel stationed at the centre, for instance:

- a. *EP Primary School (M080104), – Saboba;*
- b. *Government Hospital (L010407), Buem, and*
- c. *Sikoko (E082104) – Okere.*
- d. The Commission's Observer also reported that at *Top Church – Tepa (F460105) in Ahafo Ano North*, security personnel came around on patrol and never came back. Also, at *DA Primary School-Mbanaayilli-2 (M161803) - Kumbungu Constituency*, security personnel on patrol came to the centre in the morning and returned around 4:53pm.
- e. Further, one security officer in plain clothes, wielding a gun was present temporarily at the Information Service (G040101) - Sefwi Wiawso.

### ***Suspected Treating***

- 19. At the *Nobisco A1 (M141312A) - Tamale north* polling centre, a *motor king* loaded with food in black polybags was shared to voters (both those who have voted and yet to vote).

At *Mallam Town (A070610) - Essikado Ketan*, transportation fares were given to some voters who commuted from outside the district.

On the basis of the reports the Commission received from over 198 constituencies, 211 districts and 303 polling centres across the country, the Commission is of the view that, the elections were generally free, fair and transparent and that infractions on citizens' right to vote, especially vulnerable persons, were minimal.

Nevertheless, more effort should be committed in future to educating vulnerable persons, the EC officials and related actors as well as security personnel on how they can proactively contribute to the fulfilment of the Right to Vote for vulnerable persons.
